**DAVID HARUM FILM IN CITY**

MASTERPIECE WILL BE ACTED FOR PUBLIC.

William Grande in David Harum to Show for Two Nights.

One of the greatest character studies ever contributed to the American stage, "David Harum" enacted for several years by the distinguished star, William H. Inspection Trip by Dairy Students  
 Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 6.—To study herds, equipment and methods of the most successful practical dairymen and breeders of Western Oregon, about 25 or 30 students of dairy husbandry at the Agricultural College will start on a tour of the lower Willamette country on Thursday, May 6. The itinerary has not been definitely arranged, but will include the big community breeders' Jersey sale at Independence May 12.

Besides inspecting the dairy farms the students will visit some of the larger creameries and milk plants of Portland. Owners and operators take a keen interest in the visit of the College students and explain to them many valuable points of dairy production, manufacture and marketing.

State College Declares Standard.  
 Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 6.—Stating that "The only thing which this great and magnificently equipped institution lacked to meet the requirements of a standard college was the foundation of a full four years of secondary work for entrance," the specialist of the United States Bureau of Education says that the Oregon Agricultural College should be rated as a standard college when its requirement of a four-year secondary course for entrance to the degree courses goes into effect in September, 1915. The report further notes the fact that the college has added one year of secondary work to its entrance requirements and has announced the raising of these requirements to four years of secondary work to take effect in September, 1915. "In every other respect," concludes the report, "this institution fully meets the terms of both the Salt Lake City resolutions."
