The railroad man's picture is on at the Arcade Monday and Tuesday. It is the famous "Rule G," and for these performances Manager Gardiner has ordered all ushers to wear overalls and carry lanterns.

Rice, the director, that railroad men themselves, because of their high efficiency, could be readily developed to play the roles. First Renter on Reservation Dies
Pendleton, May 6.—James Jacobs, pioneer resident of this county who had the distinction of being the first renter on the Umatilla Indian reservation, died this morning at 8:15 o'clock, death being due to ailments coming with advanced age. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Folsom chapel.

Deceased was one of the best known of the early day settlers of this county. He was living in this vicinity when there was no Pendleton and platted one of the additions to Pendleton, known now as Jacob's addition. During recent years he had been farming on Tutuilla creek but a year or more ago sold his ranch to Gilman Folsom. However, he and his wife continued to make their home there and it was there that death found him. His widow survives him.

Finds Plenty of Snow
Pendleton, May 6.—A trip over the summit of the first range of mountains was made last Friday by W. E. Daggett and two sons and Lester Locke. They wanted to see whether the amount of snow in the high mountains was unusually light, as generally believed. Opening of Big Canal in Oregon

Astoria, Ore., May 8.—The greatest celebration in the history of the lower Columbia river district was held here today in honor of the opening of The Dalles-Celilo canal, which took place last Wednesday.

A fleet of steamers brought hundreds of visitors to the celebration, and thousands of others arrived by train.

Steamers may now go direct from Astoria to Lewiston Idaho, where here-to-fore their cargoes had to be transferred at the Celilo Rapids in the Columbia river, to other steamers on the opposite side of the rapids.

The cargoes were portage by over a state operated railroad. The Dalles-Celilo canal was built by the U. S. government at the cost of nearly \$5,000,000 and is 8 1-2 miles in length.
