CALMNESS IS NEEDED.

If ever there was a time for a na-

tion to exercise calmness it is at this moment.

President Wilson should have the loyal support of every man, woman and child. In his guiding hand lies the future of America, and he is confronted with the most serious problem that has confronted a president since Lincoln's time.

Governor Withycombe's message to the people of Oregon Saturday evening contained the right spirit. He urged loyalty to the present administration; that people refrain from bitter talk and think with calmness on this situation which presents gravity in every angle.

The Lusitania has been sunk. International law claims no record of such an act. While Berlin and London quarrel about contraband of war, let the American people decide for themselves the best way to proceed for upon America will fall punishment for a wrong step at the present time. Those inclined to be quick in

thought and action should keep this in mind: American population is composed largely of people of foreign extraction. The Germans very naturally stand up for Germany at this time, English for England and French for France. Many of these people will view this not as an American war, but if we should enter it would have their loyalty to the United States considerably diluted in the thought that our country was taking sides where this country did not belong.

The situation is far different than when Spain and the United States went to war. Declaration of war at the present is not anticipated. We do not believe under the circumstances that such will be the case, but while the state department is working on the case, let all be calm and be loyal.

### RAILROADING OR TODAY

Be on Alert to Help Travelers Board Trains Writes Moore.

"Be on the alert to help travelers who may be waiting to board night trains at unusual hours," writes Agents L. B. Moore at Roseburg, Ore. He says:

"I read with interest an article in a recent number of The Bulletin by agent at Medford headed 'Assist patrons after they reach destination,' especially timid or unaccompanied women. Supplementing this, I would suggest the need of going still farther and be on the alert to volunteer to help those who may be waiting to board night trains at unusual hours. To make my point clear, let me quote from a note I received from my night ticket clerk a few days ago.

"This morning when I was leaving passenger depot to go to freight depot I noticed an elderly lady near a certain restaurant who had two grips with her. She was looking towards the depot, so I took the liberty of going over and accosting her. I learned that she desired to leave on the train and had gotten up early

for fear of missing it. She said some of her folks were sick at San Luis Obispo, California. She had purchased her ticket at Brooks, Ore. and arrived here on No. 17 the previous evening. I invited her to the depot and placed the ladies' waiting room at her disposal, where she was made comfortable until train No. 13 arrived. She was very grateful to me for the kindness and I think will be a friend to the Southern Pacific for a long time."—S. P. Bulletin.

### Pan-American Congress Opens

Washington, May 10.—A meeting of ministers of finance and bankers of South and Central America, began today in this city. This conference was called by President Wilson to enable the Secretary of the Treasury and American bankers to go over the situation with the South American financiers, the purpose being to devise ways for bringing about a closer financial and commercial union between these countries and the United States. Congress appropriated \$50,000 for the entertainment of these bankers as guests of the government, and the President is now making plans for the affair.
