### THE FORUM Where Every One Has His Say

La Grande, Ore., May 10.—(To the Editor.)—There has been considerable comment about our prohibition law to the effect that voters voted for prohibition and now the legislature has made a law whereby people can get booze, drink booze, sell booze and make booze.

The facts are these: A person cannot under any circumstances get booze, either by buying or making it, or having it given to him either within the state or procuring it from without the state, if the booze is to be used for booze purposes in any way shape or form. But he can get from a pharmacist ethol alcohol for medicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical and scientific purposes, and for external use upon prescription from a doctor, and when he gets it he has to make a sworn affidavit that he will use it for the purpose above; that he will not sell or give it away; that he is not addicted to the use of intoxicating liquor or any narcotic drug, and the druggist is only allowed to give him two quarts in four successive weeks, and he can only get that much altogether, as he has to swear that he has not got any from any other druggist in that time. Now the physician is liable, the druggist is liable and the person is liable for a violation of the law with reference to obtaining the liquor in the wrong way.

Now this ghost story about shipping the booze to individuals. An individual can ship two quarts of booze or 24 quarts of malt liquors in a month but they must swear it will be used for sacramental purposes only, before he can get it out of the post office, express office, or freight office or from any common carrier. Now if any of you want to get in some booze to drink and want to swear to a lie and run a chance of getting caught and being taken up for perjury, why go to it, as that is the law.

Not only that, but no newspaper, magazine, billboard, or periodical or sign shall offer for sale any booze and if it does the publisher and the advertiser are both liable to fines.

If any lodge, club or any society sell booze or give it away to members or others they are liable to fine.

If any person take booze to any dance hall or any gathering or have any in his possession, he is liable to fine.

If any druggist violates the law once and then on the second conviction he shall be fined and in addition shall have his license taken away to even have a drug store for six months.

All the prescriptions signed by physicians and sent to druggists have to be kept on file by the druggist and a report made to the county clerk

every month, and if they fail to do any of the acts they are liable to fine. A man can't even make hard cider for his own use.

In fact all the avenues of escape of the lawbreaker are shut off, and anyone who wishes to see the whole law on the subject I would be glad to show it to them, in our new 1915 session laws just off the press.
