BROWNTON ON LIBRARY BODY

COMMISSION NAMES SUCCESSOR TO JOHN COLLIER.

Connecting Sewer May Be Built—Road to Intake Repaired.

H. S. Brownton, a dentist, has been named to succeed John Collier on the Carnegie Library board. His appointment was made and confirmed last evening at the regular weekly meeting of the city commission. Mr. Collier resigned when he moved to Portland a few days ago.

The entire commission was present. President Russell presiding, and Commissioners Gardner and Palmer at the desks. Monthly reports came up for consideration. The O.-W.'s "bill" of \$1.20 per year, as payment for a sewer right of way across O.-W. property was presented and allowed.

Only one bid was received for the sale of the five acre tract south of the city once used for pest house purposes. Joe Clark presented a bid of \$31.00 per acre, and the matter was laid over one week.

Resolution preliminary to building a short piece of connecting sewer in the vicinity of Cedar and Oak on M and N streets, came up for favorable consideration.

The manager was given authority to improve the road to Beaver creek which is now in poor shape, and as considerable hauling will be necessary over this road it is imperative that it be repaired.

General manager's report for the week ending May 8th, 1915. No fires last week.

The street superintendent spent \$122.87 including \$7.00 prison labor. Of this \$92.40 was for cleaning streets and putting eight loads of sand on the Fir street macadam. It also included the work on the road to the reservoir south of town. The superintendent spent \$28.52 for cross walk lumber and \$1.85 for tools and repairing tools.

The police arrested three on state charges and five on city charges. Three for being drunk and two for being disorderly. There are five in jail. Served 17 meals; had three sleepers. Eleven head of stock were in the pound. Fes \$11.00 besides the feeding expense. Nine dogs were killed. No fines.

The engineer completed the design and estimates on enlarging the present reservoir. Also routine grades and other work. His assistant worked 13 hours.

The water superintendent spent \$78.00 lowering pipes. This is work that the cold spell of last winter indicated was needed.

The recorder collected \$11.00 pound fees; \$11.75 improvement district No. 1-A, with 50c interest and \$2.00 for four building permits. He drew a warrant for \$459.35 on the B. P. O. E. sinking fund for a bond of \$450.42. The accrued interest on same was \$8.93. Also a warrant on the same fund for \$622.69 being \$606.71 par and \$15.98 accrued interest. The recorder drew salary warrants for \$1593.17 and \$683.10 for labor certificates. He also drew a warrant for \$116.42 on the park fund on voucher 31.

The treasurer collected \$295.31 paying installments; \$164.30 interest on same; \$4.30 interest improvement district No. 90; \$4.40 interest improvement district No. 95; \$10.80 sewer 22, section No. 3; \$889.67 water rent; \$25.00 moving picture license for four months; \$10.05 dray license; \$20.00 for a year's plumber's license and \$1.50 for three electrical permits. He paid \$520.50 water warrants; \$497.80 road warrants; \$142.90 park warrants; \$500 general fund warrant with 50c interest on same. He paid \$549.84 improvement district interest; \$4000.00 for paving bonds; \$475.02 improvement district No. 95 warrants with \$12.75 interest; \$428.98 improvement district No. 97 warrants with \$8.50 interest on same.

The city has now redeemed all of the first issue of paving bonds amounting to \$61,433.03. The treasurer has called \$6000.00 of issue two. This issue amounts to about \$26,933.64.

Child Laborers of the West.

The program of the Child Labor Conference to be held at San Francisco May 28th-31st has just been announced. An entire session is to be devoted to a discussion of "Child Labor in the West," with La Hor Commissioner Clary of Arkansas, Commissioner Olson of Oregon, and various officials of the California Child Labor Committee and San Francisco Juvenile Protective association among the speakers. At the same session Lewis W. Hine, the Staff Photographer of the National Child Labor Committee and the only social photographer in the country, will report on child labor conditions in the west as he has found them. Mr. Hine is at present making a study of child employment in the far western states, and the first report of his findings will be made at the San Francisco Conference.

Speakers of national reputation such as Dr. Felix Adler, the Chairman of the National Child Labor Committee, and Mrs. Florence Kelly, general secretary of the National Consumers' league, will launch a campaign for the introduction into the next Congress of a bill similar to the Palmer-Owen bill which passed the House of Representatives by an
