At the conference of committees of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, held at Chicago last summer the chairman of the social and industrial conditions department passed resolutions urging every state federation of clubs to assume the responsibility of printing and posting throughout their respective states a warning to keep girls from going alone to San Francisco in 1915. The committee wishes the clubs of the country to give the utmost publicity concerning this danger.

The Neighborhood club of La Grande has been informed that the women of San Francisco are determined to prevent the letting of a portion of the fair grounds for the purpose of establishing house of prostitution and are doing all in their power to stay the evil.

Let it be remembered that the country will be scourged for girls to supply the demand for this nefarious business, and every means that is possible for man to conceive will be used to snare and mislead these girls in order to secure them.

Every girl should be warned against advertisements of positions in San Francisco, for every place that is worth while will be taken and the door that is open to the strange girl will be the door that leads to perdition.
