NONE HELD NOW IN MOON EPISODE.

Police Authorities Let All Go Who Were Held as Suspects.

The action was taken on the inability of the officers to gain substantial evidence whereby to clinch the act to any of them, the victim of the assault not being able to give the officers assistance in the matter.

One of the several held, was in the city jail and the county jail held the balance. These have all been given their freedom.

Seeks Divorce After 20 Years.

Baker, May 14.—Iphratia Calligan yesterday through her attorney, Jas. H. Nichols, brought suit for divorce against her husband, Charles Calligan. The complaint alleges they were married at Galesburg, Ill., on March 7, 1895. For the last five years they have resided at Cornucopia, where the defendant has been employed as engineer.

According to the wife, her husband is an habitual drunkard, does not provide for his family, has treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner, that she was compelled to leave him but returned on his promise to do better, which promises were never kept.

The wife asks for the custody of their minor children. They have six altogether, one married, and the older boys are able to make a livelihood for the family. Mrs. Calligan also \$20 a month alimony, alleging that her husband earns \$3 a day.
