

WALLOWA IS MEET VICTOR

GOOD TIME MADE BY CONTESTANTS.

Individual Honors Go to Enterprise Man in Meet.

Wallowa, Ore., May 16.—(Special)—Wallowa won the annual county track meet which was held here Saturday, in easy fashion. The score of the meet was: Wallowa, 82; Enterprise, 40 and Joseph 7. Lostine failed to score a point. As Wallowa has now won the meet for three consecutive years, they have permanent possession of the large cup offered by the Wallowa County O. A. C. club. Burleigh of Enterprise won individual honors with 27 points. Greer of Wallowa was next, with 24 points. Greer would undoubtedly have scored more points than Burleigh, but he fell down twice in the low hurdle race, and failed to place in this event. The records in the running events were poor, as the track is a slow one, and was made worse still by the recent heavy rains, but the records were good in most of the jumps and weights.

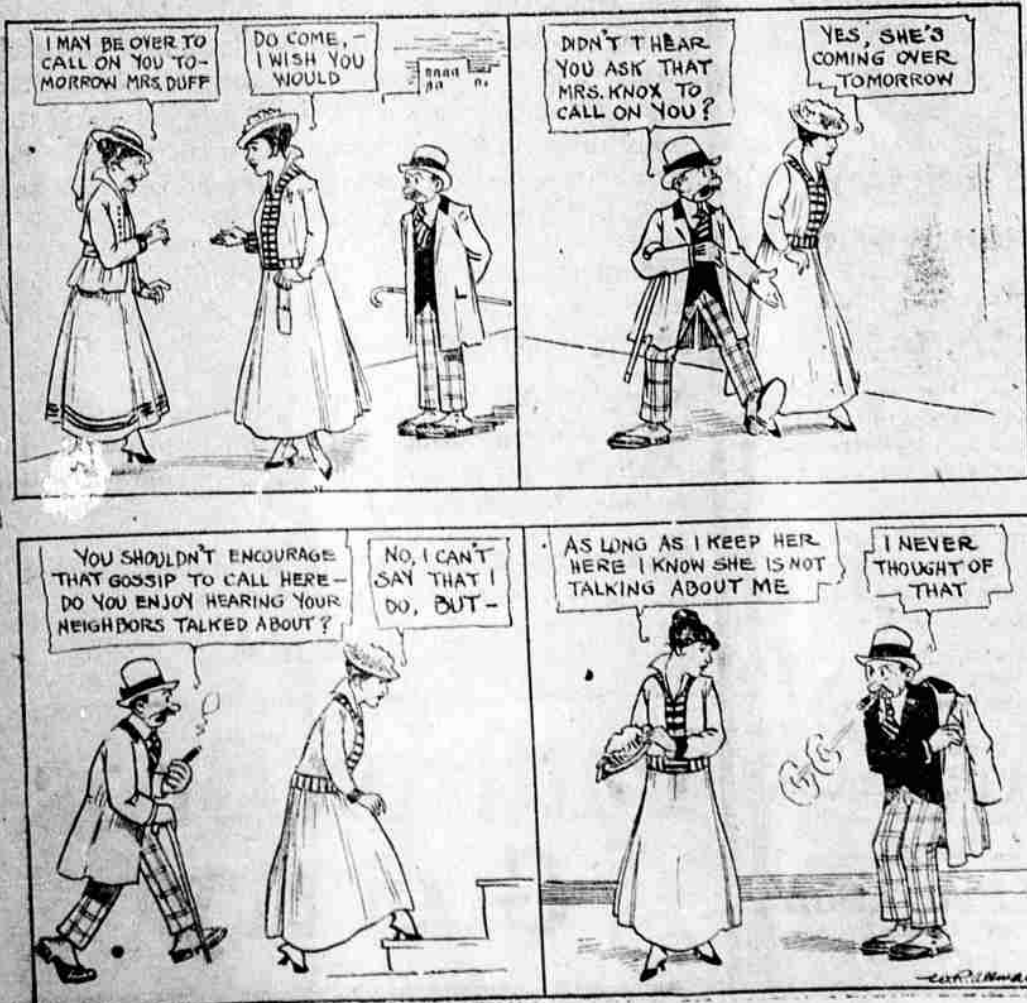

***** WHAT IS A "CABARET" ***** New York, May 14.—New York has a question on its hands that promises to take rank with the famous "How old is Ann?" and to cause as much trouble to the municipal authorities as the federal officials were involved in a few years ago by the attempt to define whiskey. The latest problem is to find a satisfactory answer to the question "What is a cabaret?" While the License Commissioner of the city is the unfortunate individual who must solve this puzzle he is receiving plenty of aid though little enlightenment from voluntary assistants. The question was raised several days ago by a group of theatrical managers who complained that their business was being hurt by the cabaret shows. They said that, whereas they paid licenses of \$500 a year apiece and were compelled to obey fire laws and other ordinances, the restaurant keepers were putting on shows like theirs and paying only a "dance" fee of \$50 a year. Specifically the managers stated that stages, scenic effects and printed programs have recently become accessories of the New York cabaret show. The answer to "What is a Cabaret?" will depend largely upon the answers given to questions such as these: If in dancing a lady elevates her foot above her head and keeps it there, at what point does the performance cease to be a dance and become a contortion act? If a singer is invited to mount a table to sing her song and obeys the call, does the performance cease to be a cabaret show and become a theatrical show because a stage is used. The restaurateurs have been warned that they are approaching a limit and that unless they reduce their "shows" they will be compelled to take out licenses at \$500 apiece. They have promised to see what they can do to modify their performances without curtailing the activities of their cashiers. Some of the proprietors say that they would be only too glad to cut down the extent of their shows if an agreement could be reached by which all competing restaurateurs would abide.

New Law Lauded.

(From Portland Journal) One of the important laws which will become effective May 22 provides a method for the formation and incorporation of rural credit unions. The law was drafted by a commission appointed by Governor West after the commission which investigated rural credit systems in Europe returned and made its report.

As the former governor is much interested in the subject of rural credits and in the success of the Tumalo irrigation project, which was begun and completed under his administration, he is preparing to assist the settlers on the project to organize a rural credit union as soon as the law goes into effect. It no doubt will be the first rural credit union to be organized in the state. "The Tumalo project is an ideal place to organize a rural credit union," said Mr. West. "The settlers are all interested in the same project."

"I want to see them start off right. We seem to have a good law, and I want to see the by-laws of the union so drawn that they will be not only comprehensive but will throw the fullest safeguards around the organization."

LANDERS HAS QUIT SCHOOLS

RESIGNS SUPERINTENDENCY AT PENDLETON.

Successor Has Not Been Named by Pendleton School Board.

Pendleton, May 17.—At a meeting of the local school board held at 11 o'clock this forenoon the resignation of J. S. Landers as city superintendent was officially accepted, to take effect June 30.

An announcement to this effect was made this afternoon by W. E. Brock, chairman of the board and is confirmed by Landers. It is understood the resignation of Mr. Landers was tendered sometime ago but was not officially accepted until today.

Mr. Landers has been superintendent of the Pendleton schools for the last nine years and under his administration the schools have flourished and grown. He has been in high esteem by people of all classes and there is much regret by many friends over the fact he has severed his connection with the schools.

Concerning who will have the superintendency here no announcement has been made as yet and reports upon that point are conflicting.

He is preparing a set of by-laws which he will submit to the state superintendent of banks for his consideration and approval. This will be done this week.

"Organization entails considerable detail," said Mr. West "but after that the operation of a rural credit union should be simple and the venture should be profitable one."

The former governor already has had the matter up with some of the settlers on the project, who are anxious to have the union formed. He expects to visit central Oregon shortly in the interest of certain irrigation matters and will take it up with the settlers at that time.

Under the law seven or more persons may organize a rural credit union. The par value of shares must not exceed \$25. The directors and advisory committee can receive no compensation for their service, so the cost of conducting the organization is to be kept as a minimum. Only members can obtain loans.

To encourage thrift further among individual members, to get them to invest their savings in the stock of the union, instead of hoarding it, and then when they need a little extra money to market their crops, or for other purposes they can get it from the union at a low rate of interest.

The idea is that the farmers and citizens of comparatively small means will have a means of financing their own needs. Invested in the union, their savings will be drawing interest and at the same time it is intended that the funds shall always be available when they need short time loans. The law is adapted from the rural credit unions which have been a marked success in European countries.
