PENSION LAW CHANGES

May 22 Will Be Seen More Latitude Yet More Protection Also.

When amendments to the widows pension law become effective next Saturday, changes suggested by two years of experience under the original law passed by the 1913 legislature will be made in handling the cases. These changes give more latitude to the court granting the pensions yet protect the court from those who would secure the pensions without being properly qualified for them.

Fraud practiced in securing of a pension is made a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of from \$5 to \$200, a six months or less jail sentence or both fine and imprisonment. Pensions are execution, thus making sure the use of the moneys given for the care and benefit of the children whom the law is designed to protect.

Discretion is given in the granting of pensions. Where it is considered practical mothers will be permitted to work away from home a certain number of days during the week, but only when such absence can be without

A limit of \$40 is set on the amount of pension under the new act. Pension of \$50 is the largest granted in this county, and that was allowed a woman with 11 children.

It was found the mother of the family was enabled to care for her brood easily on this amount with help from the older children and supervision by a pension visitor.

Kidnap Girl Who Looks Like Murdered Daughter.

Denver, Colo., May 20.—So like his murdered daughter, Steven Puskas, 35, has kidnapped ten year old Rosa Nagy, according to the police who have instituted a state wide search for the missing pair.

Seven years ago Puskas was a coal miner in Holden, W. Va. One day he came home from work to find the bodies of his wife and little daughter hideously hacked and carved by a robber who had stolen Puskas' life savings of \$3,200. Puskas, unable to endure the scene of his sorrow, came to Colorado. He placed two sons in an institution in Detroit.

John Nagay, father of the missing girl, heard this story from Puskas' own lips. Puskas often told his friend John that little Rosa strongly reminded him of his murdered daughter. A strong attachment grew up between Puskas and Rosa. Recently he told another Nagy child: "Rosa is going to stay with me. We are going a long way." They disappeared that night.

Moon Has No Influence.

Scientists are now convinced that the moon has no more influence on crops than it has upon the temperature or the amount of rain or the winds or any other weather element. The growth of plant depends upon the amount of food in the soil and in the air that is available for them and upon temperature, light and moisture. The moon obviously does not affect the character of the soil in any way, neither does it effect the composition of the atmosphere. The only remaining way which it could influence plant growth, therefore is by its light. Recent experiments, however, show that full daylight is about 600,000 times brighter than full moon light, yet when a plant gets 1-100th part of normal daylight it thrives little better than in absolute darkness. If 1-100th part of normal daylight is thus too little to stimulate a plant, it seems quite certain that a 600,000th part can not have any effect at all. It is therefore a mere waste of time to think about the moon in connection with the planting of crops. The moon, say the scientists, has nothing more to do with this than it has to do with the build-

Cash donations will be spent in this country in the purchase of these. We particularly appeal to large manufacturing and industrial houses for gifts in kind." Acknowledgements from Queen Alexandra and Winston Churchill first lord of the admiralty, for consignments already received, are included.
