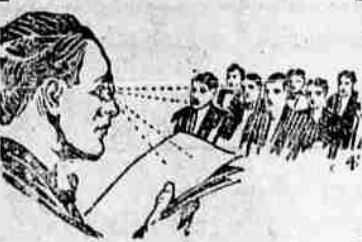

OVER 250 NEW LAWS GO INTO EFFECT SATURDAY

Approximately 265 laws and amendments passed by the 28th Legislative Assembly, which adjourned February 20 last, will become operative next Saturday. Measures making appropriations for state departments and institutions and several others carrying emergency clauses became effective when signed by the Governor. The prohibition law, regarded as the most important measure of the session will not go into effect until the first of next year, the constitutional amendment providing for state-wide prohibition not becoming operative until that time. The permanent registration law and the tax law also will not be in force until then.

Among important measures which will take effect next Saturday are those regulating employment agencies to protect employees, compelling trustees of educational and philanthropic funds to make reports to county courts, changing the Railroad Commissioner districts so as to give the section east of the Cascade Mountains representation on the Commission, amending the workmen's compensation act enlarging classifications and making fees more equitable reorganizing the Fish and Game Commission and providing that the Governor shall be the head, consolidating the office of the State Highway Engineer with that of the State Engineer, making Sheriffs instead of County Treasurers tax collectors, repealing all but a few continuing appropriations and, because of the abolition of the death penalty, making the punishment for first degree homicide life imprisonment.

An important law passed at the last session, which I. N. Bingham, Senator from Lane County, who introduced it, declares will curtail public expenditures, limits the tax levies. It, however, will not be in effect until next year. The act provides that for each year after 1915 the authority of all taxing bodies shall be so limited as to prohibit the levying of a greater amount of revenue than the larger amount levied in either of the last two plus 6 per cent. In the event the amount is not considered sufficient a special election may be called for the electors to determine what the levy shall be.

The demand for Oregon-made goods should be given an impetus by the law, becoming effective next Saturday, which provides for a differential of 5 per cent in favor of concerns which have plants located in this state in the award of contracts for public work and the purchasing of materials and supplies for public use.

Election Law on List
After next Saturday, as the result of a new law, electors will be entitled to vote for six delegates to a party convention for the nomination of a candidate for President and Vice-President instead of one under the present law. It provides that each Congressional district shall be represented by two delegates and that there shall be four from the state at large. It also repeals the section of the old law providing that the state shall pay the expense of the delegates at the conventions, making a saving of about \$10,000 every four years to the commonwealth.

Acts providing for rural credit unions, the maintenance of a permanent exhibit of Oregon products by Portland, having as its nucleus the state exhibit at the Panama-Pacific Exposition; adopting specifications of National Bureau of Standards in weights and measures department and dividing the state into four districts, in each of which shall be a deputy scaler, making it optional with counties as to whether they shall have School Supervisors, providing for civic centers in school districts, making terms of notaries public four years and fees \$5, providing that all state department pay for their own printing, repealing the law providing that physicians must have professional nurses administer anesthetics, increasing maximum amounts from \$10,000 to \$12,500 that may be allowed counties for fairs, extending jurisdiction of Portland District Court to Multnomah County, empowering Governor to direct Attorney-General to prosecute criminal actions in any district and abolishing (annual school meetings in Portland, will become effective.

Among other laws to become operative next Saturday are the following: H. B. 41—Provides for satisfaction of mortgages by foreign executors, administrators and guardians, and the recording of letters testamentary, letters of administration or guardianship.

H. B. 81—Amends section 21, chapter 355, general laws, and relates to the making up of jury lists in district courts.

H. B. 85—Gives wood cutter lien upon output for wages.

H. B. 53—Regulates discharging and paroling of patients at state hospitals.

H. B. 106—Wages due made perfected claims in case of assignment of employer.

H. B. 120—Makes it unlawful to display signs or advertisements within limits of any state highway.

S. B. 9—Abolishes office of State Immigration Agent.

H. B. 151—Empowers soldiers and sailors and veterans of Civil War to fish and hunt in open season without paying license fee.

S. B. 97—Provides that local agents of State Land Board shall file \$1000 surety bonds.

H. B. 77—Confers right of eminent domain upon corporations organized for manufacturing, generating, selling or disposing of gas.

H. B. 109—Amends section 17, Lord's Oregon Laws, so that time of disability of an insane person or a person imprisoned on a criminal charge shall not be a part of the time limited for the commencement of actions by such persons for recovery of real property.

H. B. 123—Amends section 7099

Lord's Oregon Laws, so that all female persons are deemed to have arrived at the age of majority when married, for the purposes of consenting to the adoption of an illegitimate child, when shown they are mothers.

S. B. 116—Amends section 2467, Lord's Oregon Laws, so an appeal may be taken by person who demanded a jury from judgment in a justice's court given upon verdict of such jury unless the judgment be for a fine or amount of money not less than cover a more favorable judgment on appeal, he shall not recover costs and disbursements in the Circuit Court.

S. B. 24—Provides for state recorder of brands, fees for recording and for the appointment of stock inspectors.

Game Restrictions Made.

Sub H. B. 6—Makes it unlawful for hunters to lie in wait at licks, trails or runways, creeks, rivers or lakes for deer or use dogs in hunting game animals.

H. B. 97—Regulates and provides manner for dissolution of union high schools.

H. B. 135—Amends section 1196 Lord's Oregon Laws, relative to limitation for inheritance tax liens.

H. B. 200—Provides that banks shall not be liable to a depositor because of non-payment through mistake and without malice of a check which should have been paid unless depositor can prove actual damage.

H. B. 201—Empowers Governor to fill vacancies in office of United States Senator.

H. B. 204—Makes it unlawful to fish with traps, weir, fishing dam or fish wheel in numerous rivers, bays and creeks.

H. B. 172—Permits fishing by man or member of his family without license upon his own land, in Pacific Ocean, or tidal salt waters.

H. B. 192—Provides bounty of 10 cents for scalps of gophers and moles in Marion County.

H. B. 208—Changes boundary line between Lane and Douglas counties.

H. B. 315—Detaching strip of land from Linn County and annexing it to Lane for approach for bridge.

H. B. 209—Permits cities to acquire by purchase or gift grounds or property of any cemetery association within the corporate limits.

H. B. 221—To protect and conserve purity of municipal and domestic water supply giving the State Board of Health authority in the premises.

H. B. 251—Provides penitentiary terms for persons who try to wreck railroad trains.

Accident Reports Required.
H. B. 285—Provides that public utilities and other employers shall report accidents to State Industrial Accident Commission, and that public utilities also shall report accidents to the State Railroad Commission.

S. B. 14—Amends Section 4617, insurance companies with paid up capital of \$200,000 must deposit \$25,000 to do business here.

S. B. 23—Empowers counties to unite in building bridges over streams dividing counties.

S. B. 82—Providing methods of foreclosing liens on personal property.

S. B. 96—To pass to bona fide purchasers of state lands the after-acquired title thereto in cases where the state had no legal title at the time of such sales.

S. B. 117—Empowers judges to dismiss juries or instruct juries, on Sundays or legal holidays.

S. B. 132—Provides County Treasurers first Monday each month shall deposit with County Clerks all county orders redeemed.

S. B. 134—Provides that County Clerks shall January 1 and July 1 each year publish in one issue of a weekly paper claims allowed by the court.

Teachers' Salaries Regulated
S. B. 137—To prevent discrimination in the payment of salaries between male and female teachers in the public schools.

H. B. 100—Provides for payment monthly of salaries of state officers and employees.

H. B. 303—Amends section 1, chapter 283, so incorporated cities and towns having a population of more than 1000 may own waterworks railways, etc., without the boundaries of the corporations.

H. B. 429—Legalizes acknowledgments taken in interval notaries' commission expired and before renewed.

H. B. 446—Granting to teachers in merged district certain protection and relief.

H. B. 18—Amends Section 5230, Lord's Oregon Laws, so it is unlawful to fish in the Willamette River for salmon other than with hook and line south of the suspension bridge at Oregon City.

S. B. 190—Amends Section 4, Chapter 58, General Laws, Oregon, Providing certificates: Life certificates, \$3; five-year certificate of renewal, \$2; primary five-year state certificate, on renewal, \$2; one-year state certificate, \$2; renewal one-year state certificate, \$1; special certificate, \$3; temporary county certificate \$2.50.

H. B. 155—Provides for the lending of sinking funds of school districts at interest not to exceed 8 per cent a year.

H. B. 440—Authorizing the employment by the Governor of special agents for the capture and conviction of criminals.

S. B. 110—Amends eight-hour law so employees of state do not come within its provisions.

S. B. 118—Permits farmers and others to establish state banks on co-operative plan.

Counties May Build Bridges.
S. B. 149—Provides that County courts, after advertising for bids for building bridges that cost more than \$500, if not satisfied with any of the bids, may reject all, employ a superintendent and build the bridge themselves.

S. B. 164—Authorizes an attachment of the amount covered by an insurance policy or liability or indemnity for injury to person or property upon an execution issued upon a cause of action for damages or injury to person or property covered by such policy.

S. B. 175—Creates office of parole officer with salary of \$125 a month.

S. B. 184—Provides registered pharmacist in good standing in another state may be admitted to practice in this state upon payment of \$10 fee.

S. B. 297—Creates Fourteenth Judicial District.

S. B. 234—Fixes salary of County County at \$1800 a year.

S. B. 259—Creates Eighteenth Judicial District.

S. B. 265—Regulates salmon fishing in Columbia and also passed by Washington Legislature.

S. B. 28—Provides for transfer of escheated property to state.

S. B. 91—Provides for prevention of sale of bedclothing, part of which has been used before for such purpose unless so labeled.

S. B. 187—Authorizes two or more counties to create road building district and build highway in such district.

S. B. 198—Provides for County Courts dividing counties into road districts.

S. B. 263—Authorizes County Courts to appoint county fruit inspectors upon petition of not less than 25 resident fruitgrowers.

S. B. 59—For establishment and maintenance of an agricultural experiment station in Hood River.

H. B. 288—Provides method for incorporated city or town surrendering charter and ceasing to exist.

H. B. 294—To regulate sale of meats coming from outside United States.

H. B. 431—Provides for adequate notice school district meetings and for publication of budgets of estimated revenues for ensuing year.

Naval Militia Changed
H. B. 456—Amends bill creating Naval Militia, cutting appropriation to \$15,000 for biennium, and places department under supervision of Adjutant-General.

H. B. 467—Subjecting all tax-levying districts, except cities having a population of more than 150,000, to the budget laws provided for counties.

H. B. 468—Remits penalties and interest on last half taxes for 1913 and 1914 and first half 1914.

H. B. 195—Provides method for producers and consumers organizing into co-operative associations to obtain better results.

H. B. 450—Levies excise tax on use of trading stamps, measured by gross receipts of firms or persons using stamps.

S. B. 13—Repeals act providing for system of uniform accounting.

S. B. 64—Provides county high school tuition fund.

S. B. 84—To secure to school districts having more than 20,000 children of school age interest on school funds.

S. B. 135—Provides that state officials and employees must obtain permission of Governor to go outside state at state's expense.

S. B. 264—To provide employment for convicts and to encourage flax industry. Appropriation \$50,000.

S. B. 243—Provides penitentiary sentence for failure to support wife or children when there is lack of justification.

S. B. 270—Provides that persons desiring to practice medicine must have been graduated from colleges having four-year terms. Present practitioners excepted.

H. B. 117—Requires County Courts to have official audits of records of county officials annually.

H. B. 118—Appropriates \$3000 for exterminating rabbits in Eastern Oregon.

H. B. 272—Regulates sale of eggs from foreign countries.

Banking Laws Simplified
H. B. 439—Empowers State Bank Superintendent to name assistant superintendent and simplifies banking laws.

H. B. 453—Amends section 4740 Lord's Oregon Laws so persons holding diplomas from schools of osteopathy recognized to be of good standing by the Oregon Osteopathic Association may try examination in certain branches for certificates to practice.

H. B. 476—Directs tax collectors to carry forward delinquent taxes to current rolls and note same on tax receipts.

H. B. 187—Regulates chiropractic practice and creates State Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

H. B. 227—Amends election laws to provide for two instead of three judges in polling places.

H. B. 88—Creates Twentieth Judicial District.

S. B. 269—Creates Nineteenth Judicial District.

H. B. 112—Provides for organization of drainage districts.

H. B. 207—To prevent unlawful discrimination in receiving and purchasing milk, cream and butter fat.
