

STOCK SHOW THIS YEAR REPLETE WITH BANNER RACES AND BIG PRIZES

Just a week or two now, and that day of days by which Union citizens to a man antedate their municipal and individual history will have dawned—meaning of course the annual Union Horseshow. The time is almost here, June 2nd, 3rd and 4th are the dates, and anyone who visits Union, if but for an hour, comes away infected with at least a portion of the booster virus that germinates so successfully and persistently in the stockshow town. Every year the complete announcements as to rules, regulations and what not, are issued a few days prior to the opening of the show, and the same is true this year. Stockmen are receiving handsome premium lists telling them what to do, and what not to do. Emissaries from the public pulse say that there will scarcely be a stable or a barn in Union county that boasts of a purely bred stock that will not have its very best on parade in the Union show. Stockmen await for the event, and as stock is primarily a requisite in a stockshow, the promoters at Union have given much time and attention to insuring presence of a good array of stock. How well they will have succeeded, will be made clear when the annual stockshow parade winds down the streets of Union on the mornings of June 2nd, 3rd and 4th.

To set out clearly the specific rules under which the show is operated, the Observer quotes herewith from the premium list, not, however, giving a list of the many classes of competition for the various kinds of stock, but selecting at random such events as the public generally will see from the grand stand.

General Rules and Regulations
Judges—The single judge system will be the policy of the show, and in every case the judge is selected with the utmost care, and as far as possible, will be of state or national repute.

It is the intention of the management that no premium or distinction shall be given any animal that is not deserving.

Awards—Colors denoting awards will be as follows:
 Royal purple Championship
 Blue First
 Red Second
 White Third

The ribbons will be placed on winners immediately after the decision of the judges.

Parade—Parade will be formed on the grounds and will take place promptly at 12:30 a. m. on each day of the show, June 2, 3, 4.

Classification—Any animal can compete in more than one class, and in any and every prize and sweep-stake groups or special to which they are eligible under the classification.

All animals pure bred must be registered with a registry association, recognized by the U. S. Government unless otherwise stated in classification. Pure bred animals under one year need not be registered if the sire and dam are registered, as above mentioned.

The association reserves the right to change or modify any rule or rules herein.

Announcement.

The Seventh Annual Union Live Stock Show will be held on the permanent beautiful grounds of this Association at Union, Oregon, June 2, 3, 4, 1915.

Large as was every phase of previous events of the annual show which has been held during the past six years there is every assurance that

the coming exhibition will far out-rival its predecessors, and equal if not eclipse the largest and most successful of similar shows held throughout the great Northwest. Institutions of this kind are of inestimable educational value in promoting the growth, development and improvement of the various breeds of live stock in general.

One of the main objects of this show is to encourage the breeding and feeding of improved breeds of live stock for well defined practical purposes. Due regard will be given to symmetry, size, form action, constitution, vigor and general characteristics of various breeds, with reasonable allowance for age, but due regard will also be paid to heads and graceful carriage, style and general refinement that denotes breed character—points which while not weighing on the scale, add a value to animals when being sold for breeding purposes, thus encouraging uniformity of breed type.

This annual exhibition of the best products of the various breeds of stock horses, cattle etc., gives to the true sands of people who attend it a better idea of the vast resources and output of live stock of this and adjoining communities than could possibly be obtained in any other manner.

While the officers, directors and stockholders of the Association are giving their best efforts without compensation to make this event one of which every one residing in this district and adjoining districts may justly feel proud they realize that this can only be done by the earnest cooperation of all those interested in the development and growth and improvement of the stockraising interests of this vast territory. This annual show is for the people and the people must make it. It is for the public good, and should receive the hearty support and assistance of every patriotic citizen who is interested in the growth, development and upbuilding of the country in general.

It was a happy thought to make the Union Live stock show one for the entire county, and we hope that the people, regardless of county lines, will

respond to the invitation to participate in this event by entering their exhibits of live stock from this and all adjoining counties.

The show will be more than an exhibition—edifying entertainment is highly essential, for it is to be a festival time. Recreation necessarily follows labor, and when you come to the show to study its exhibits and to take advantage of the educational features which it offers, you will be delighted with the opportunities provided for relaxation and pleasure. No pains or expense will be spared to furnish the best of entertainment. There will be races of the highest class, band concerts, etc.

General Information.

Entries—All applications for entries must be filed with the secretary on or before June 1, 1915. No entry fee will be charged. Free feed and shelter will be furnished all stock exhibited. In case where animals are duly registered, such registration certificates must be submitted to the committee for approval prior to judging. Proof of registry must accompany entry. Make entry early.

All exhibits must be in place not later than 10 a. m. June 2.

Exhibits must remain on the show grounds the entire three days. Entries should be made only in name of the owner.

Information for exhibitors—Exhibitors will please read the following rules and send their entries in as early as possible. No entry fee will be required to accompany same.

All exhibits must be on the grounds and must be placed and ready for exhibition not later than 10 a. m. June 2. A committee appointed by the Association shall examine all exhibits for the purpose of determining whether eligible for the class for which they are entered.

The exhibition will be opened to the public June 2, 3, and 4.

Admissions—The price of admission for adults 50c
 Children under twelve years of age 25c
 Admission to grandstand extra. Seats in bleachers free.
 A free pass will be issued to each

exhibitor by applying to the Secretary also to all necessary attendants to stock.

The names of all exhibitors and attendants must be written on the tickets in ink by the secretary, and are positively not transferable under any circumstances.

Some of the classes of competition are provided as follows:
Saddlers (Five Gaited Non Registered)

All horses must show five distinct gaits, viz: trot center, single-foot, running walking or fox trot.

Saddlers Five Gaited, Non Registered

Combination class ladies and gentlemen.
 All horses must show three distinct gaits, viz: walk, trot, and canter.

Pair of Gentleman's Roadsters
 Division No. 49—Shown to a gentleman's road wagon (no distinction between open and top wagons.) Horses must have good action, style, conformation, show speed and be pleasant mannered.

Pair of Gentleman's Roadsters
 Same as division 49.

Ladies Driving (Single Horse)
 Division No. 50—Shown to a road wagon (no distinction between open and top wagons.) Horses must have good action, style, conformation, show speed and be pleasant mannered.

Ladies Driving Single Horse (Pacer)
 Same as Division 50.

Ladies Driving (Pair of Roadsters)
 Division No. 51—Shown to a road wagon (no distinction between open and top wagons.) Horses must have good action, style, conformation show speed and be pleasant mannered.

Ladies Driving Pair Roadsters
 Pacers—Same as Division 51.

Combination Harness and Saddle Horse

Division No. 52—Horses suitable to use in harness and under saddle to be shown to appropriate vehicle first, then unharnessed in the ring and shown under saddle.

Jumping Competition—Gentlemen
 To be ridden by the owner or his accredited representative. To carry a minimum weight of 135 lbs. The total number of faults will decide. In case of any equality of faults the judges will require additional jumps. In case of refusal at any one fence, a horse will be allowed two more trials at the same fence; should it then refuse, it will be disqualified.

Out on the Glacier National Park Reservation, Montana, the home of the Blackfoot tribe, old Three Bears, grizzled Blackfoot chieftain and patriarch, is gathering his chosen medicine men for a trip to the Portland Rose Festival to be held at Portland, Oregon, June 9th, 10th and 11th. And therein lies a curious tale. Among North American Indians the Blackfoot have a reputation for longevity and the tribe boasts a score of hoary old patriarchs well over onto the century mark whom the grim reaper seems to have forgotten. This state

of affairs Three Bears declares is due to the use of a wonderful concoction of wild flowers and herbs of Glacier National Park, the secret of whose preparation was originally transmitted to the medicine men of the tribe by that celebrated Blackfoot personage, Sour Spirit.

Over fifty varieties of wild flowers and herbs, many of them unknown to botanists, go to make up this wonderful "medicine," to which the Indians have given the name of "Pah-toh-ahk," literally "good spirit." According to the Indian legend it originally

possessed the miraculous property of restoring youth, but one ingredient in its composition can no longer be found in Glacier National Park. The story of the wonderful Portland Rose has reached the ears of Three Bears and he believes that in its freshness and beauty lie the secret he has been so long searching for, so, emulating Ponce De Leon, he will journey with his medicine men to Portland, there to brew with mystic rites and ceremonies the magic "Pah-toh-ahk," which will restore to his tribe the lost secret of eternal youth.
