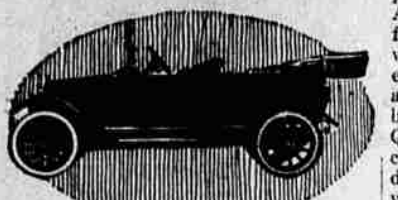

Catechism of the Motorace

The following catechism of the motorcycle races, conception and future plans, was read to the last meeting of the Commercial club:

Time of organization:—

Some three years ago there were gathered together a small body of young men of La Grande Motorcycle enthusiasts these young men at that time perfected an organization known as the Motorcycle Club, and after many meetings and long deliberations finally came to the conclusion that such an organization should have the unanimous support of the public in general; they could see no reason why it would not be of vital importance as a public means of entertainment and it was upon these grounds that this body of youngsters began to put forth their mighty efforts.

A committee was appointed in the future to meet with the La Grande commercial club, lay the proposition before them and ask their undivided support in this matter, propositions were presented to reorganize and transform their present club into a better and greater organization along the lines above set out, for the benefit and entertainment of the general public.

This proposition was likewise given due consideration by the La Grande commercial club, and at this time both clubs became motorcycle enthusiasts in fact they were all so favorably impressed in the matter that they immediately called together a meeting of La Grande representative citizens for the further promotion of the motor races, the La Grande commercial club, the B. P. O. E. lodge of the city, the La Grande Band, and the La Grande Motorcycle club all met as a unit and at this meeting plans were laid and adopted for the purpose of chartering a train to leave La Grande for the Pendleton Round Up and other points for the sole purpose of advertising the Eastern Oregon Motorcycle meet to be held in La Grande June 17th 1915, and known as "Speed 'em Up." 200 mile race.

If the people will kindly lend me cars we will do our best to answer many question that have been put to us from many sources. First and foremost we want you to understand that this is public entertainment and we think the public has a right to know all about the conditions governing this organization, and we shall proceed to tell you all we can in the way of questions asked and answered.

Q. Where is the race going to be?
A. Mount Glenn Speedway about three miles North.
Q. What is the admission?
A. Admission is \$1. this includes seats.
Q. How are we going to get out there?
A. All Taxis and Automobiles of La Grande will be at your service.
Q. How much is the Taxi service round trip?
A. We can not at this time answer this, but you have our assurance that we will do all we can possibly, to get this fare down to the minimum.

Q. Are there going to be any seats?
A. Yes we are going to build a grand stand for you to set in and this is free with your paid admission.
Q. Is there going to be any place to put our cars?
A. Yes there will be automobile space for parking right in front of the pits where you can have full view of the entire entertainment from your autos, space will be reserved for you by seeing the committee in charge.

Q. Is this organization a private concern, and are the members going to divide up the profits among themselves for private gain?
A. The motorcycle club is a public organization for the sole purpose of public entertainment, all profits are placed in the hands of our Treasurer to be used each successive year for the promotion of a greater Motorcycle event.

Q. What will be done with the money subscribed by the business men of La Grande for this purpose?
A. This money is to put up for a guarantee of the \$1,000 Prize, which must be placed in the hands of the referee in gold coin before the races will be allowed to start.

After the entertainment is over, all gate receipts and entrance fees will temporary be placed in the hands of the treasurer, and the general expenses will be checked out to the individuals who are indebted to then the balance if there is any will be returned to the business men of La Grande, who contributed and if there is not enough to pay them in full they will receive their part of the funds according to the amount they paid in.

Some of our expenses:—
Big automobile street parade in the forenoon, best decorated auto \$50.00 first prize, second prize \$25.
Big Moose band will furnish music for you during the day. Then comes the climax, "One great big serpentine Pavement Ball, starting at 9 o'clock sharp and Home Sweet Home will bid you adieu at the hour of 12, this is free to every body and you are cordially invited to be there.

Q. Are the races going to be held at Mt. Glenn each year?
A. No, if this years entertainment is a success we are going to build a two mile track right in the edge of town, and do all we can for the comfort of everyone.

Q. Why are they giving this entertainment during the week and not on Sunday?
A. In as much as all moral and spiritual codes of organized society and sacred Scriptures request that mankind shall keep the Sabbath Day Holy, we feel it our duty to act in keeping with the demands of the powers far greater than ours.
