Petition Started at Pendleton to Re-tain Veteran Teacher.

Pendleton, May 24.—In an effort to have Superintendent J. S. Landers retained as head of the Pendleton school system a meeting was held at the Methodist church Saturday evening and action was taken to have petitions circulated in behalf of Mr. Landers' retention. It is said that 10 of these petitions are now being circulated.

It is stated that the meeting Saturday evening was not a Methodist gathering but was made up of church people from the different local organizations. A chairman was selected and a committee named to attend to the circulation of the petitions to the school board. These petitions were drawn by a local attorney.

The move to retain Mr. Landers is based on current reports that his resignation was asked for by the

terday morning Rev. Hodshire took up the subject and made point criticism of the school board. The following summary of his remarks was submitted to the East Oregonian for publication.

"The time sometimes comes when forbearance ceases to be a virtue, and that time has now come in Pendleton. When the school board will turn down a man whose only crime is that he has done his duty, and is known and acknowledged to be one of the very best school men of the board. At the Methodist church yesterday of Oregon, or any other state for that matter, and has brought the schools of Pendleton to the high standard they now occupy, it is time for the people to be heard.

"When a few men on Main street and a school board can turn down a man like Prof. Landers it is time for the people to speak out. Any judge of our courts that will enter into such a scheme as that which the school board of Pendleton has entered into is, in my judgment, an unsafe man and should not be entrusted with power.

"There is a movement on foot to petition the school board to ask Prof. Landers to remain at the head of the Pendleton schools. And I trust that every loyal citizen of Pendleton will sign the petition. I have been in close touch with school work all my life, having taught a number of years myself, and I am frank to say that I have never met a superior school man to Prof. Landers. I feel that it is a burning shame to lose such a man from this community when the moral standards needs up-lifting so badly. If the school board refuses to reinstate Prof. Landers they should lose the support and respect of all decent people.

"It is reported that one of the board has said 'It makes no difference what the people say, we will not reinstate Prof. Landers.' Here is a good place to use the recall."

From the School Board.

When informed of the criticism made of the board by Rev. Hodshire, the following statement was made in behalf of the board.

"Rev. Hodshire does his friend, Superintendent Landers, an injustice. Professor Landers resigned and so far as is known his resignation was voluntary. The school board acts in the interests of the whole community rather than in the interest of any individual. In the selection of teachers from superintendent down the sole consideration of the board is the welfare of the school system."
