

GAME LAWS CHANGE SOME

MATERIAL CHANGES NOW IN EFFECT.

Women and Children Need Not Have Licenses Any More.

Many changes are now in effect pertaining to the game laws. County Clerk Ed Wright has codified these changes with relation to Union county as follows:

Boys under the age of 14 years and women are not required to have license for either hunting or fishing. Hunting and fishing licenses will be issued free to Civil war veterans upon proper application being made directly to the county clerk.

Imnaha game refuge has been abolished.

All fines for violation of game laws retained by the county. Five per cent of all license fees retained by the county.

Deer with horns: open season from August 15th to October 31st. Bag limit 3 in any one season.

Game birds: ducks, geese, shore birds, etc., September 1st to February 15th. Bag limit 30 in 7 consecutive days.

Sage hens: July 15th to August 31st. Bag limit 5 in one day or 10 in any 7 consecutive days.

Prairie chickens: October 1st to October 15th. Bag limit 5 in one day or 10 in 7 consecutive days.

Grouse: August 15th to October 31st. Bag limit 5 in one day or 10 in 7 consecutive days.

Doves: September 1st to October 31st. Bag limit 10 in one day or 20 in 7 consecutive days.

Chinese Pheasants: October 1st to October 10th. Bag limit 5 in one day or 10 in 7 consecutive days, except that no bag of 5 birds shall contain more than one female and that no more than 2 female birds shall be killed in any 7 consecutive days.

Trout, over 6 inches in length, open season from April 1st to October 31st. Bag limit 75 trout or 50 pounds in one day.

Trout over 10 inches in length, open season all the year with hook and line only. Bag limit 50 trout or 50 pounds in one day.

Bass, catfish, etc., open all year with hook and line. Bag limit 40 pounds in one day.

Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott has sent out postcards to all automobile owners calling attention to changes in the laws now effective relative to automobiling. The notice says:

Important to all motor vehicle owners—Chapter 350, Laws 1915, in effect May 22, 1915, provides that number plates cannot be transferred from one motor vehicle to another motor vehicle.

The number plates assigned by the Secretary of State to a motor vehicle remain with such motor vehicle during the year for which it is registered. It is the motor vehicle that is registered, not the owner.

Upon sale of a motor vehicle the purchaser must notify the Secretary of State. He will furnish a transfer blank which must be signed by the purchaser and returned for filing together with the statutory fee of \$1.00. No sale or transfer is valid unless the required transfer notice is given by the purchaser and the fee paid by him.

The foregoing requirements in effect May 22, 1915.

Junior Classes at Y. M. C. A. Have Interesting Contests.

The Cubs were winners of the "A" Class Junior division of the Y. M. C. A. in their track meet held last Saturday afternoon. This class, which is made up of the older grade school boys, has for nearly three months been divided into three teams, which in various ways have contested. The track meet which was held Saturday afternoon was but one of the features of the contest. The Cubs, captained by Grant Geddes, won first place with a total of 32 points, Seals, captained by Edmond Holmes, second with 23 1/2 points, and the Beavers, captained by Donald Ackley, third with 21 1/2 points. Following is the detailed account of the winners:

50 yard dash—Galloway, Cub, first; Ackley, Beaver, second; Beardon, Seal, third.

220 yard dash—Ackley, first; Galloway, second; Horstman, Cub, third. High jump—Beardon, first; Holmes, Seal, second; Horstman, third.

100 yard dash—Galloway, first; Ackley, second; Beardon, third. Pole vault—Beardon, first; Horstman, second; Kivette, Cub, third.

880 yard—Horstman, first; Bradley, Beaver, second; Geddes, Cub, third.

Javelin—Beardon, first; Kivette, second; Geddes, third. Broad jump—Ackley, first; Kivette, second; Beardon, third.

Relay race—Won by a combined team from the Seals and Beavers, with the points divided between the two teams.

The standing of the teams of this class up to and including Saturday, May 22nd is as follows: Cubs, Grant Geddes, Captain, 2647; Seals, Edmond Holmes, Captain, 2169; Beavers, Donald Ackley, Captain, 1877.

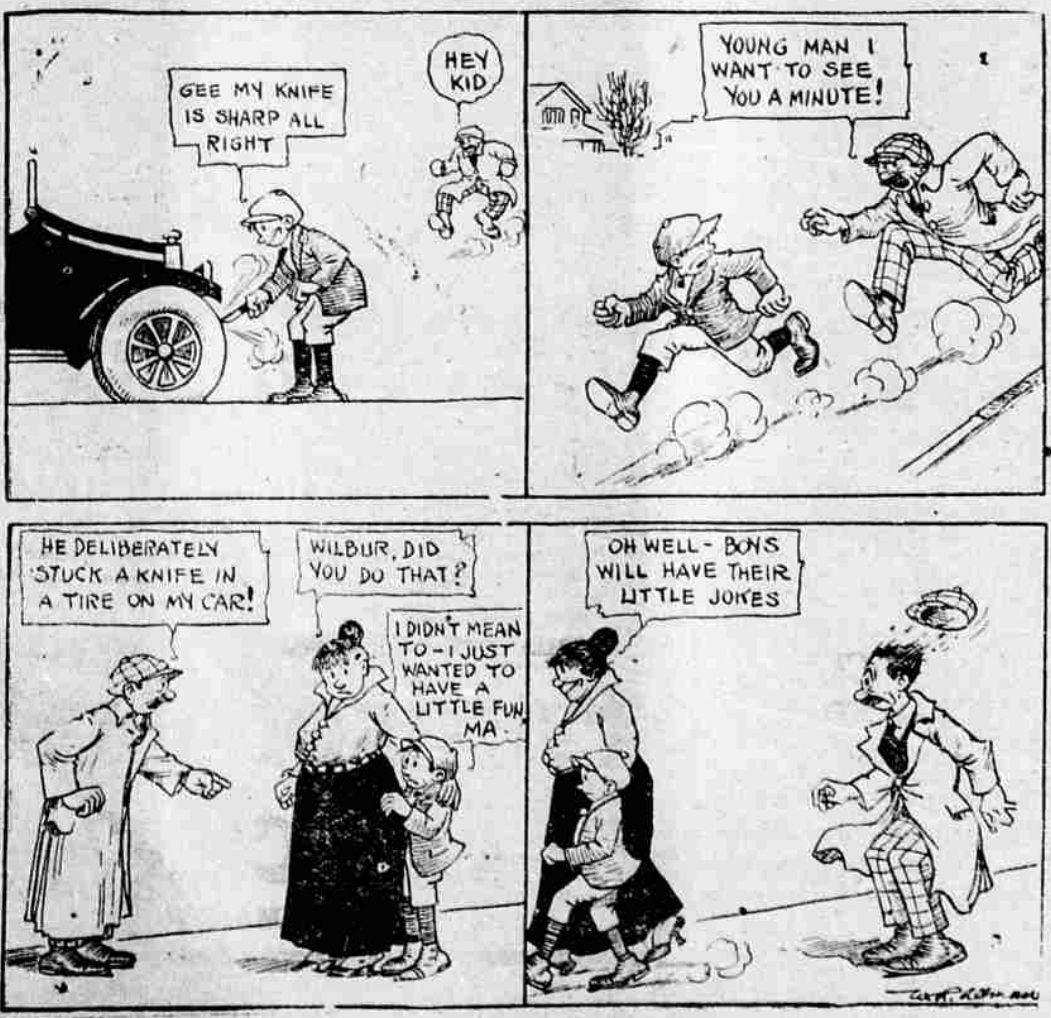
