

NINE SALOON LICENSES OUT

ONE OF THE 10 EXISTING DOESN'T APPLY.

Paving Project in Alley Called Off—Commission Meets.

Nine out of the 10 saloons now existing in La Grande were last night granted renewals of licenses up to December 15th. The petitioners asked for six and a half months but the commission at its mid-week session allowed the license to December 15th only, the usual extent of such licenses. Those granted licenses were George T. Weisenberger, Christ Wright, Herman Roesch, Julius Fisher, R. Kelly, George E. Good, J. D. Kerr, J. E. Foley and Ulrich Lottes.

The commission last evening rejected the Clark bid for the five-acre tract South of the city which the commissioners are trying to dispose of. They will readvertise for bids at once.

A majority of the property owners having property abutting the alley between Washington and Adams avenues and Elm and Fir streets, last night remonstrated against the construction of alley pavement. The prospect for paving that alley is therefore dubious.

The apparent settlement of the weather insures speedy construction of the rim to the reservoir intended to about double the capacity of the storage water. Material is in the city for the work and construction will no doubt begin at once.

General Manager's report for the week ending May 22nd.

To the Commission.—The Water Superintendent, lowered a four-inch main on Grandy avenue from Second to Oak at a cost of \$74.05; placed one tap and one meter and 20 feet of three-fourth inch pipe at a cost of \$5.00.

The Police arrested six on city charges and six on state charges. Collected \$4.00 fines and \$10.50 board for California prisoners. Three meals served city prisoners and 35 state prisoners. Three sleepers. Only two dogs killed last week.

The Street Superintendent spent \$105.35 during last week. Besides cleaning streets he built the walls and floor in another section of the basement under the city building. This included \$33.00 prison labor and \$1.00 worth of soap.

The Recorder collected \$4.00 fines, \$45.40 principal and \$4.50 interest on improvement District No. 13-B and \$10.50 for meals for the forgers held here for California officers. Issued a dray license on a \$5.00 treasurer's receipt and an automatic base ball license on a \$15.00 receipt. He drew a warrant on the Park fund for \$3.75 on voucher No. 27, and one for \$1.00 on voucher No. 26, and a warrant on the Road Fund for \$57.00.

The Treasurer collected \$229.04 water rent; 250.50 paying installments; \$555.30 paying interest; \$2.50 for five electrical permits; \$625.00 for a six months saloon license; \$5.00 for a dray license and \$15.00 for an automatic baseball license to run six months on Depot street. The Treasurer paid \$556.34 water warrants; \$57.00 Road warrant; \$4.75 Park warrant; \$45.00 Imp Dist. Interest and \$278.00 principal and \$26.07 in-

terest on General Fund warrants previously called.

The manager has conferred with the Water Superintendent and the City Engineer on the rim on the reservoir. We have ordered all the material. There are only a few yards of gravel on the ground. The form lumber is also on hand. The most of the steel is at the depot. Rest will be shipped today. We arranged to store the car of cement. The city to pay the storage and the teamster to unload it.

The lime has been stored at Clark & Sawyer's at the expense of the drainage. We are unloading the asphalt so far it is strung from end of Fourth St. to the reservoir. The Street crew dragged the road to the reservoir. Respectfully submitted.
