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## News From Over the State

**Flagstaff Mine Will Start Up**  
Baker, May 27.—That the Flagstaff mine will resume operations within the next 60 days is the statement of Attorney James H. Nichols, who represents the owner, John G. Cleary of Boston, who acquired title to the property some months ago. The mine is a well known property and has been a big producer in the past and is well equipped in every detail, including mill and cyanide plant. A contract will be made for power with the E. O. L. & P. company.

**Respected Lady of Haines Died.**  
Haines, May 26.—Mrs. Mary A. E. Porter, aged 79 years, died this afternoon at the home of her sister, Mrs. James H. Ingram, after an illness of only a few days. Miss Porter was in her usual good health up to last Friday, when she contracted a cold which developed into a severe attack of la grippe, which was to much for one of her advanced years to overcome. She was born in Tennessee but spent her girlhood in Arkansas, coming to Oregon with Mr. and Mrs. Ingram in 1882. They lived in Baker for a time and until 1892 on a ranch near Pochontas. They moved to Haines in 1892, where Mrs. Porter had since made her home. She was a member of the Methodist church and was a highly respected and esteemed lady. Mrs. Ingram, her sister with whom she made her home, is her only living relative. The funeral will be held here Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

**Huntington Miner Accused of Theft.**  
La Grande May 27.—Sam Lombard, a Huntington miner swore out a complaint before District Attorney Godwin this morning against Sam Taylor, another miner of the Huntington district, alleging that Taylor had stolen about \$50 from him while the two were riding from Huntington to Baker last night. The hearing has not been set.

Taylor asserts that Lombard lost the money it was after they reached Baker, and says that he himself lost all that he had.

A. H. York, who was driving the machine in which the trip was made, says that Taylor threatened to "high grade" his companion, and that he saw him reach into Lombard's pocket. He says also that Lombard had a considerable quantity of paper money in small denominations, that Taylor had but one \$20 bill in paper, but that the latter paid him with a \$5 bill when they reached Baker.

**Union Boosters Here Tomorrow**  
Baker, May 27.—Union boosters will visit Baker tomorrow to invite Baker to the Union Stock Show June 2, 3, 4. Because of the bad roads only a few will come up and only an informal reception will be given them. Will Vogel, one of the leading boosters of Union, said over the telephone today that Baker Day will be Thursday of next week. He also says that they have more exhibits and more entries than ever before so that a good program is assured.

**Homestead on \$8000 Reservoir**  
Baker, May 27.—A case involving a new point of law in this county was filed this afternoon when James H. Nichols instituted injunction proceedings against John Calloway and others, seeking to restrain them from interfering with irrigation dams in the vicinity of Elk creek, owned by Bird Spaulding and W. B. Vaughn. The complaint alleges that an \$8000 reservoir built by the plaintiffs on government land with state permission seven years ago is used to water the 1000 acre Bird and Spaulding ranch four miles from this city, and that the defendants have filed on the reservoir site as a homestead and have torn out the dams. The plaintiffs are basing their case on the rights already vested in them as owners of the reservoir. Judge Anderson granted the injunction.

**Wife Won't Come**  
Baker, May 27.—Because his wife preferred the effete East to life in Baker county, Frank S. Weise filed suit this morning in circuit court, asking for divorce. In his complaint in which he alleges desertion, he concedes Mrs. Weise the right to keep their two year old daughter. Mr. Weise alleges that he came to Baker county and rented a farm in this vicinity in 1914, leaving his wife in Sioux City Iowa, with the understanding that she was to join him later. This, however, he asserts, she refused to do, although on several occasions he wrote offering her transportation.

**Honor System Adopted at University**  
Eugene, Or., May 26.—An honor system, whereby juniors and seniors in the university are eligible to be placed in an upper division by their major professors and to take special work in certain subjects, was adopted by the faculty yesterday afternoon in a faculty meeting. The plan is the outcome of a suggestion made by Professor Herbert Conbie Howe, head of the department of English literature at a colloquium meeting last fall.

A resolution to the effect that student body festivities shall be greatly restricted next year was also adopted yesterday. The meeting was adjourned until 4 o'clock this afternoon.

**Desert Land Board Asks for Reports on Projects**  
Salem, Or., May 26.—At a meeting of the state desert land board yesterday afternoon State Engineer Lewis was directed to submit a report relative to the reclamation work accomplished by the Jordan Valley Irrigation company, and also on the

project of the Deschutes Land company. The board also decided to inspect the Tumalo irrigation project on June 25. The report as to the Jordan Valley project will be used as a basis for a contract for the reclamation of the project, and the report with relation to the Deschutes Land company's project is intended as a basis for an extension of its contract.

**Attorney General Names Third Deputy**  
Salem, Or., May 26.—Attorney General Brown has appointed J. O. Bailey, associated for the past five years with the law firm of Platt & Platt, of Portland, second assistant. I. H. Van Winkle occupies the position of first assistant, and Joseph Benjamin that of third assistant. The last legislature increased the attorney general's number of deputies from two to three. Bailey is a graduate of Harvard university, and prior to engaging in practice in Portland practiced in Spokane.

**Policy Holders to Pay Assessment**  
Salem, Or., May 26.—Notice of assessments has been forwarded to approximately 900 policy holders of the defunct Horticultural Fire Relief Association of Oregon by Insurance Commissioner Wells. None of these policies was paid up to the 100 per cent of the standard board rate, and all are subject to assessment under the law to pay the liabilities of the company.

**Insurance Companies Sued for Loss**  
Kelso, Wash., May 26.—The mountain Timber Company, of Cowlitz county, represented by Senator A. H. Inaus of Kalama, has filed with State Insurance Commissioner H. O. Fishback papers suing 22 fire insurance companies. The amount of insurance claimed by the Mountain Timber company is \$270,000. According to the complaint, a fire at Kalama last July destroyed the mill, lumber yard and dock of the lumber company, valued at \$300,000. The 22 companies in which \$270,000 insurance was carried are charged with having been negligent in settling for the loss.
