German Prisoners Many. Berlin, June 2.—During May, 268,869 prisoners were taken by German forces in Galicia, an official statement asserts. In addition, 863 officers were captured.

Bomb Hits Theatre. London, June 2.—Bombs dropped by a German aviator hit upon a moving picture theatre in Warsaw and killed a score of women and children, dispatches stated today.

Another son, who had been attending college at Corvallis, joined them here. Mr. Davis became ill Sunday and it was found necessary to remove him to the hospital for an operation.

Withycombe Will Aid Red Cross. Salem, Or., May 31.—Governor Withycombe announced today upon receiving from C. Q. Devol, acting chairman of the American Red Cross, an appeal for aid for unfortunate Mexican people, that he would take the question up with members of the Red Cross society in this state.

"I shall take the subject up with members of the society," he said. "Probably the most efficient way will be to appoint a special committee to handle the work. My advice is that a truly pitiable condition exists in Mexico, where thousands are facing starvation almost in sight of our fields of plenty. I am sure there will be many here who will feel able and willing to help."
