Thieves With a Sweet Tooth

Minneapolis, Minn., June 2.—Three times burglars looted the confectionery store of C. M. Simonson. Then he placed steel bars on the windows. The next morning he walked down to his

"The German government believes that it was acting in justified self-defense in seeking with all the means of warfare at its disposition to protect the lives of its soldiers by destroying ammunition intended for the enemy."

"The company is held guilty of the death of the passengers in that it attempted to use American citizens as a protection to ammunition aboard carried in violation of American law. Quick sinking of the Lusitania is attributed to the explosion of ammunition on board."

Final decision on the demands made in the note from the United States is withheld until an answer is made to this note.

SEEKS SAFETY

Gold and Securities of European Capitalists Deposited in New York Vaults

New York, June 2.—Not less than \$150,000,000 possibly as much as \$250,000,000 in tangible wealth has been transferred to the United States by European owners since war began to threaten in June of last year, according to a member of one of leading international banking houses here. While it is impossible to estimate with any accuracy the extent of such funds, the banker in question based his knowledge of the extent of foreign business handled by other leading houses in the same line. This flood of incoming wealth began to make its way to this side of the Atlantic before the actual outbreak of hostilities, and has continued in varying volume ever since. Some of it is in the form of gold, more of it is in standard securities or in American currency received from the sale of such securities. Apparently the owners, who comprise representatives of practically every old-world country, feel that under present conditions America is the safest place for valuables of this description. There has been gossip to the effect that several European rulers and members of the royal families have deposited large amounts here against the possibility of unpleasant results arising from the war. Such stories cannot be confirmed, but it is known that many very wealthy Europeans now have a part of their fortunes deposited in this country. While the greater part of the enormous aggregate of wealth which has sought the United States for safe-keeping is likely to be withdrawn at the conclusion of peace, it is the opinion of most well-informed bankers that a goodly proportion of it will remain here and will seek American investment. This movement of stored-up capital to this country added to the enormous purchases of American goods for European account and the resale of American securities formerly owned in Europe, is regarded as an influential factor

Points Presented in Germany's Reply

"The German government has no intention of submitting neutral ships in the war zone which are guilty of no hostile acts to attacks by submarines or aviators."

"If neutral ships have suffered owing to mistakes in identification, it is a question only of quite isolated and exceptional cases which can be attributed for the British government's abuse of flags, together with the suspicious or culpable behavior of the masters of ships."

"The German government, in all cases in which it has been shown by its investigations that a neutral ship, not itself at fault, was damaged by German submarines or aviators, has expressed regret over the unfortunate

Piping Rock Racing Association.

New York, June 2.—Harry Payne Whitney has arranged for an added attraction at the Locust Valley race course following the races of the Piping Rock Racing club, today. It will be a polo game against the Copperstown four.

Whitney, who lead the Meadowbrook polo team to victory two years ago, expects to have the old members of that team with him. The Copperstown team will probably be composed of players who did not make the international team two seasons ago. It is expected the polo game will draw great crowds. The game will be played right after the racing.

Echo Up In Arms Against Railroad.

Pendleton, June 1.—Aroused by action of employees of the O. W. R. & N. in starting to build a fence across the street leading to the Echo depot, Mayor Hugh Smith of Echo, is here today preparing an injunction suit against the company. The complaint had not been filed at 2:30 this afternoon but it is expected it will be filed this evening or in the morning.

There has never been any legitimate crossing of the railroad right of way at the depot but for years the principal street has continued across the track without any objection on the part of the company. Yesterday however the work of building a fence separating the end of the street and the right of way was undertaken, but before it had proceeded far, the town marshal had arrested the foreman for obstructing the traffic and the work was stopped.

Fearing that it would be started again today, Mayor Smith came to Pendleton this morning and retained District Attorney Stelwer to bring suit. So far as maps of the town show, there are no provisions made in the entire town for crossing the tracks. Inasmuch as the school is on the opposite side of the tracks from the principal part of the town, the

school children have used the right of way as a crossing. The question arises whether the company can now shut off this avenue of traffic.

It is presumed that the action of the company grows out of the accident some months ago in which a woman lost her life between the wheels of a train near the depot. The matter may be taken before the railroad commission for settlement.

Escapes Mad Dog By Bandage

Baker, June 1.—A cut finger proved a blessing in disguise to Albert Shaller of near Keating Saturday, when the injured member saved him from almost certain infection with rabies. Shaller works on the Cranston ranch near Keating and a few days ago cut

his finger badly while splitting wood. He bandaged the cut and was at work mending a fence Saturday, when a dog that had been acting suspiciously and loitering about the place suddenly attacked him.

But when the animal snapped, its teeth made no contact with flesh. The bandage was in the way, and Shaller, jerking loose his finger, left the folds of cloth in the dogs mouth.
