Roseburg, Ore., June 3.—A special election was being held here today to vote bonds in the sum of \$300,000 to aid in the construction of a railroad from Roseburg to the boundary of the national forest, thirty miles to the east.
The bond issue, if voted by the electorate, will be the bonus asked from the citizens by Kendall brothers of Pittsburg, Penn., to aid them in constructing a standard gauge railroad to the vicinity of their extensive timber holdings on the North Umpqua river.

Oregon Road Officers Get Help

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 2.—Road supervisors and other officers interested in building and maintaining public highways of Oregon may now secure the services of a specialist in road construction and maintenance in solving their problems of best types of roads for their district and the best methods of construction. The Agricultural College Extension department has arranged to have Professor G. V. Shelton, highway engineer, consult with those who wish to secure advice and assistance in solving their problems in the best interests of their constituency. Professor Skelton's work is strictly advisory and is limited to questions of grades, types of road for given district, best means of construction, and similar matters, and is without charge to the people of Oregon. Those wishing to take advantage of this service should write the Extension division, R. D. Hetzel, director so that arrangements may be made to have Professor Skelton's visit made when he is scheduled for work in their part of the state. In case assistance is desired before September 1st the requests should come in at the earliest possible date.

THE STATE'S INDUSTRIES

BRIEF REVIEW OF EVENTS TAKING PLACE.

Industrial Phases Discussed by Salem Correspondent.

Salem, June 2.—Salem hospital association will erect \$25,000 hospital. The Dalles, June 3.—County court opens bids on \$20,000 highway work. The Moser cherry crop has been sold at \$90 per ton. Pendleton orders four additional streets paved with gravel bitulithic. North Bend orders Virginia avenue improved to cost \$11,000. Industrial Accident Commission cost to date: Surgical and hospital bills \$56,858.81; salaries and expenses \$59,267.63; paid for workmen's injuries \$97,880.65. Set aside for dependents in fatal cases \$140,573.71. Child industry instead of only restraining children give them something to do. Baker—Eagle River power plant completed to operate Virtue mine. Eugene factory promotion committee considering manufacture of boilers. Coal is being mined in quantities near Toledo, Lincoln county. Total per capita taxes at Portland \$45.41. Total taxes \$36,328,000. County Assessor Reed estimates this sum would buy food and fuel for 82,380 families of five persons each for one year. The tax burden equals the labor of 29,230 men for one year. Winchester Bay is a new townsite near Gardiner. Albany—J. P. Wallace putting in foundation for brick block. Cottage Grove—Ore stamp mills in Bohemia mines make record run. Manufacture of ink established at Salem. Commonwealth conference at State University gave great prominence to Pinchot conservation policies. Labor leaders favor state printing common grade school text books. Suit of workman injured on logging train for \$25,000 damages dismissed by Judge McGinn, as man got \$84 benefit under industrial compensation act. The new state insane asylum building at Pendleton is to have a corner stone of Oregon granite. This rest is probably imported. Resolutions were adopted by regents of Monmouth Normal school that new \$50,000 training school building be built and equipped of Oregon material and manufacture, and that trimmings be of Oregon stone. Salem school board refuses demand of central labor council that only union labor be employed in erecting new school buildings. Rainier—H. C. Mowrey has purchased pant here and will be known as Mowrey Lumber & Timber Co. Planing mill being installed, dock facilities improved, sheds being extended and plans to operate soon. Wheeler—Bailey sawmill plant begins operations this week, cutting 50,000 feet a day. Fossil—L. A. Johnson will erect a stone or brick store building. The O. W. R. & N. announces that construction work, entailing the expenditure of \$1,000,000 will be undertaken immediately. It will include new terminal facilities at Walla Walla, new division headquarters at The Dalles, completion Coyote-Echo cut-off in eastern Oregon and the establishment of another terminal at Pilot Rock junction near Pendleton.

Reducing Chick Morality

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 3.—The science of bacteriology has come to the aid of the chicken raiser. The destructive diseases, white diarrhoea, is caused by bacteria and some valuable work has been done on this disease by Mr. G. D. Horton of the Bacteriological Department of the College. Mr. Horton identified this disease last year in the flock at the State Hospital, Salem. Serious losses had previously occurred there in the raising of chicks. The source of the disease was found to be in the breeding hens, the infection being transmitted through the egg to the chicks. That the disease came from the breeding stock has been corroborated in a striking manner. The Poultry Department of the College is doing some cooperative breeding work at the State Hospital and furnished the Institution 200 pullets last fall from which stock there has been produced over 3000 chicks. The losses from all causes has not exceeded 2 per cent, while if the chicks hatched from eggs laid by the old stock in which the white diarrhoea germ had been found, the loss was over 50 per cent.

Build Sidewalks

Baker, June 2.—At the weekly meeting of the city fathers yesterday Mr. Finley reported that a number of people who had been ordered to build new sidewalks have refused flatly to comply, and the city faces the necessity of building the walks and taking legal steps for reimbursement against the owners of the property. Some walks are in a deplorable condition and dangerous to the public, and with the owners refusing to obey orders the city has no other alternative. City Attorney McColloch suggested an idea that may be carried out, and that is that the city place signs on all property where the owners have refused to build new walks, notifying pedestrians that the walks are dangerous and giving the owners' names. Mayor Palmer added the suggestion that such notices be published in the newspapers also, which course may eventually be followed if the city finds that it will have to build too many walks.
