CHERRIES IN POOR SHAPE

STATE-WIDE REPORTS SHOW CROPS FAILURE

Early Varieties Everywhere Reported To Be Ruined

Portland June 3.—That the early cherry crop in all parts of Oregon has been ruined was the opinion expressed today by some of the leaders of the local trade. While this belief was general some time ago, late advice received by the dealers from leading orchardists confirm the reports.

One of the leading cherry shippers of The Dallas who marketed about 60 tons of cherries last season here, is reported as saying that this season

he would have practically only a nominal supply to offer.

Cherries are coming to market slowly. Some from local points are appearing, but the total volume is comparatively small. Very limited offerings are shown from the Dallas The Lewiston section continues to ship fairly liberal and excellent quality.

Markets for cherries is rather quiet with prices held steady general.

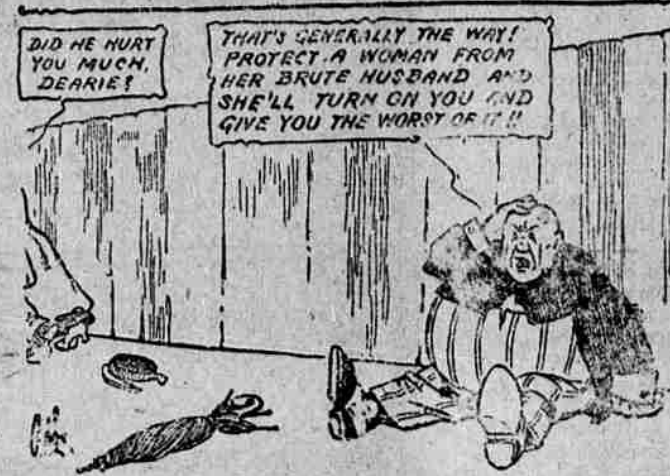

More Women Marry than We Imagine.

In the Woman's Home Companion Ida M. Tarbell writes a most illuminative and interesting article entitled "What Women Are Really Doing." Miss Tarbell takes occasion to refute with facts, which she has gathered by making a careful study of the Thirteenth Census, some of the false ideas on the woman question which are spread by platform speakers throughout the country. The "platform" says that "less than half of the forty-five million women of the country marry." Miss Tarbell answers this allegation with the following statement of facts:

"If we consider the sex as a whole, regardless of age, this is true. We have in the United States now 44,639,689 females, including all from one year and under to one hundred years and over. Fifty-two and seven-tenths per cent of these—babes, maids, and women are single that is, less than half of the sex are married. But drop out those not yet of marriageable age, and you have a different story. There will, of course, be a difference of opinion about what is marriageable age; but let us call it nineteen or over. If we settle on that, we must drop at once from our estimate something over twenty millions of the sex. It puts a different complexion at once on the marriage percentage. As a fact, seventy per cent of those who are fifteen years or more old marry; and if you raise the age to twenty, 80 1-2 per cent marry; to twenty-five 86.7 per cent marry.

"But, grant these figures to be correct—it is hard, even for an orator, to defy a census—and still the platform cries that 'women don't marry

as they once did.' The truth is they marry more freely than they did in 1900 or in 1890. There has been a gain of nearly two per cent in the number of marriages of women over fifteen in the last twenty years; and two per cent, when dealing with nearly thirty millions, is a considerable number."

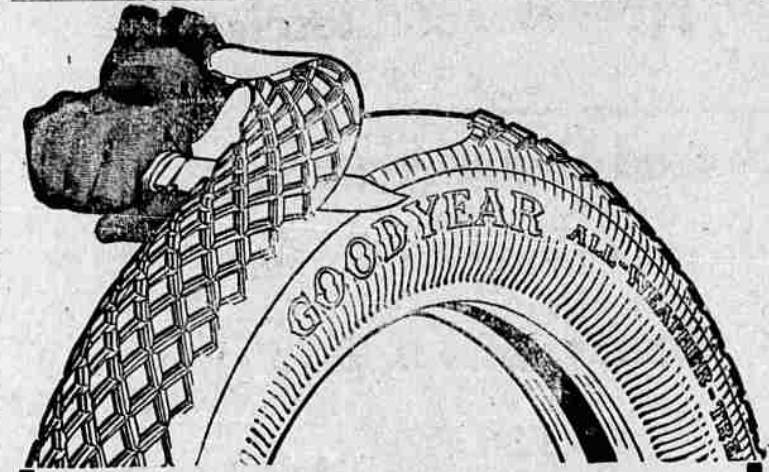
