MAN SHOT BY SHERIFF.

"In the lung," I then had him carried back to the depot. Mr. Miller telegraphed for a doctor to be at the La Grande station and we did what we could for him. County Clerk Ed Wright and E. S. Norris were instructed to care for him. When we reached La Grande it had been impossible to get a physician on the line, but after a frantic search, Dr. Holt was located. He rushed to the scene, first aid was given and the man taken to the hospital. I had no intention of hitting him, and no one regrets the affair more than I do." Mr. Miller stopped off in La Grande and gave a complete statement of the case to County Prosecutor Eberhard.

What Really Happened. Here is what took place prior to the time that Mr. Hug first saw Kief: Kief was on his way to Baker where his fiancee resides. He was looking for work incidentally, he

says, and was riding the train blinds to save his money, of which he had a few dollars when hurt. He was discovered by the brakeman on No. 18 just as the train was leaving the station, and was by the brakeman ordered off the train. This he obeyed and it was that act that Mr. Miller saw.

The hemorrhage that lasted this morning is less severe now. There may be penetrations that have not yet developed, and infection may set in. He is in a very serious condition but has a bare chance for recovery."
