District Resembles Alaska.

Zanesville, Ohio, June 8.—A trip through the Eastern Ohio mining district brings memories of Alaskan novels, for the most spectacular feature of the district is the use of dog teams.

The mines in Muskingum county are of the three-foot vein, and it is almost impossible to use mules, horses or machinery in the entries, so dogs have been substituted, the huskies, pulling the loaded cars along the tracks. Nearly 200 dogs are working in the mines in this one county.

Most of the dogs are owned by the miners, who takes great pride in the "huskies" and frequently stage dog races between teams.

The huskies, of no particular breed, must weight from 35 to 50 pounds, for the work. They are valued at from \$5 to \$15 each.
