WALLOWA HOG AGAIN IN LEAD

PORTLAND PAPER COMMENDS THE HOG MARKET.

Dr. Brunnell of Wallowa County Tops Market at Portland.

Wallowa County delivered the goods in the hog market again today and T. C. Brunnell took home the well-earned extra dime over the bulk of sales, says the Portland Live Stock Reporter. The carload of 93 hogs averaged a very little over 200 pounds and were smooth and well finished. There was no dock and the price paid for them by the Union Meat Co. was \$8.10.

Mr. Brunnell says that he raised his hogs on pasture and grain, but he penned them up on grain feed long enough to get the grass out of them and put solid flesh on them. "It is my experience," said Mr. Brunnell, "that the way to get my money out of my hogs is to get the grain in them. Hogs fed on grass with enough grain to make them fry themselves may look smooth, but they don't fool the buyer." These hogs had been on heavy grain feed for 62 days.

Mr. Brunnell pointed out a few hogs which were not quite as big as the bulk of the load and said they were out of gilts. He tries to breed mature sows always to get large litters and thrifty pigs. He says it doesn't pay to breed sows too young and sows should never be required to raise two litters per year until they are two years old.

Mr. Brunnell knows hogs from looking them in the face every day for several years and all his experience has been practical. His methods have been approved today in a practical way by this market. He got 10c per cwt. more than the bulk of sales, and as his load weighed 18,650 pounds the extra money is \$18.65 more than \$8.00 hogs would have brought.
