The Seventh Day Adventist camp-  
meeting and conference in session at  
Creston Station, Portland, Oregon,  
from May 27th to June 8th, has had  
the most successful meeting since its  
organization. On Sunday June 6th  
\$14,567.45 besides much jewelry was  
raised in one meeting for foreign mis-  
sions. In all \$20,000 was raised for the  
various forms of activity, church  
colleges, foreign and home missions.  
Temperance Sunday, June 6th saw  
the largest crowds of the campmeet-  
ing on the grounds. A number of  
powerful speakers spoke on the desir-  
ability of national prohibition, and  
the audience of three thousand de-  
clared unanimously to do all in their  
power to bring this about and give us  
a saloonless nation by 1920.  
Noted speakers from various parts  
of the nation and world were present  
in addition to the local ministers. F.  
W. Paap, secretary of the home mis-  
sionary work in North America; W. H.  
Healey, noted religious liberty advo-  
cate and debater from Los Angeles;  
Geo. F. Enoch, from India; Geo. Har-  
low from China; J. J. Westrup, from  
China; Lewis Johnson, president of  
the Western Washington Conference;  
C. Schultz, head of the German work  
in California; J. Dirksen from Mani-  
toba, and many others.
