

DENVER RACE SEASON OPENS

PARI-MUTUAL SYSTEM BEING TRIED OUT THERE.

Sporting News of Various Kinds and Description.

San Francisco, June 11.—A fleet of the fastest American yachts on the Pacific is due to sail out of San Francisco harbor tomorrow and race to Honolulu. A return race will be run from Honolulu to San Francisco, starting one week after the vessel reaches Hawaii.

For several days the waters outside the Golden Gate have been alive with craft of all sizes and rigs, making trial spins in preparation for the big event. The larger yachts are to be handicapped according to the universal rules, so that the little fellows may have an even chance.

The first boat into Honolulu harbor will receive a trophy valued at \$500, and the second a cup worth \$250. There are \$2000 worth of prizes.

One of the fastest entrants is the Hawaii, flying the pennant of the Royal Hawaiian Yacht Club. C. E. Miller's sloop Athens, one of the first to pass through the Panama Canal, also is entered. Other yachts are entered representing the San Francisco Yacht Club, the South Coast Yacht Club, and Yachting association on Puget Sound.

Overland Park Horse Racing at Denver

Denver, Colo., June 11.—The annual horse race meet at Overland Park opens here tomorrow under them ost promising conditions in years. Nearly a month ago five hundred horses were in training at the track and word went out that no more could be accommodated.

Colorado is the only state in the Union having racing under a state commission and the pari-mutual system.

Among some of the well known sportsmen here from all sections of the country are Dr. E. E. Clark and Henry Batchler, Texans, George J. J. Ferris, Kentucky; J. Van Gordon, California; Dr. C. W. Crowley, and B. A. Jones of Missouri; and J. Neil and Frank Reinhardt of Washington. All these have entries in the Colorado Derby, purse \$2,500, scheduled to be run June 26. Showing the great interest in the local meet, more than 100 three-year-olds are here and threaten to jam the field in the Derby.

The meet opening here tomorrow will continue for 20 days. Its principal races are the opening handicap, June 12 \$2,000 for 3-year-old and up, six furlongs; June 19, the Juvenile stakes, purse \$1,000, for 2-year-olds, five furlongs, the Colorado Derby, June 26, Purse \$2,000, one and one-sixteenth mile; the Denver City Handicap, July 3, purse \$1,000, five furlongs; and the Independence handicap, July 5, purse \$1,200, one mile.

Entries closed June 1. The meet is held under the auspices of the Colorado Agricultural Fair & Racing Association; managed by W. W. Finn, who also manages the Reno, Nevada track's 30 day meet opening July 17.

Chicago's Mayor Favors Boxing

Chicago, June 11.—The long cherished dream of Chicago sportdom—boxing has 225 pounds of solid-muscled support in the person of William Hale Thompson, Chicago's new mayor. Himself a once famous athlete and lover of clean sports of all kinds, he makes no bones about stating his stand.

"I am for boxing, just the same as I am for anything that requires training and clean living," he said, when approached on the matter. "Boxing has been much abused, some of it deserved and some not, but at the bottom, the game is a fine one. I used to box after a fashion and I must confess I still like to see a pair of good, clean boys in a lively tilt."

"Of course, the game must be regulated, I think the laws govern it in New York and Wisconsin excellent and am much in favor of a similar one for Illinois."

"I am working for a greater Chicago. And I realize that Chicago could become one of the greatest boxing centers in the country if the game were allowed here, under proper regulation."

"Don't think for a minute that I stand for the 'low-brow' element of boxing, but boxing conducted in a

clean manner is one of the grandest sports in the world and I'm for it."

Fish in Snake River.

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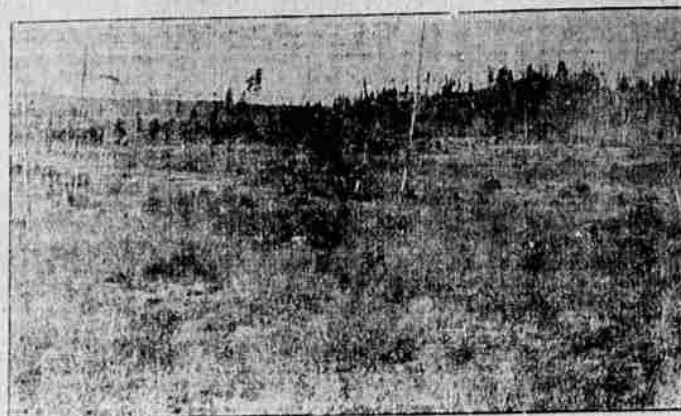
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SEVERAL NEW HOUSES HAVE BEEN BUILT THIS SPRING.
