SOLEMN RITES SAID BY ELKS

JUDGE BENNETT LEAVES MESSAGE WITH MEMBERS.

Record Crowd Present to Listen to Memorial Services.

A crowd that exceeded in numbers any previous memorial service attendance in La Grande, was out yesterday afternoon to hear Elks of this vicinity revere the memories of their dead brothers. Judge A. S. Bennett of The Dalles was the principal speaker, and he spoke with his deep insight and finished manner on the individual principles of the order. It was an address with a real message to it—one the men and women who heard will long remember. The Dalles attorney's speech reflected the foresight of the committee which invited him.

The program was carried out largely as announced previously except that the quartet did not sing, and Elsworth Ellis was added with a vocal solo.

The musical numbers were exceptionally good and it is doubtful if a more solemn tribute has ever been paid to Elks dead.

ELECTION NOTICE.

Public notice is hereby given, that on the 13th day of December, A. D. 1915, a general election will be held in the City of La Grande, in the County of Union and State of Oregon, for the purpose of electing one commissioner for the term of three years, and also submitting the following charter amendment to be voted on:

"An act to amend the charter of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon," filed in the office of the City Recorder of said City on the 6th day of October, A. D. 1915, which was proposed by initiative petition signed by the requisite number of legal voters, and submitting the same to the electors of said City for their adoption or rejection, at the regular election to be held therein on December 13th A. D. 1915.

The polling places designated for said election and the judges and clerks appointed to conduct said election, are as follows:

THIRD WARD—Polling place at W. D. Grandy's house on the west side of Second street, between Grandy avenue and Palmer avenue. Judges—Mrs. P. L. Thornton, J. M. Hiltz, W. D. Grandy. Clerks—Fred Currey, Howard Davis.

FOURTH WARD—Polling place at Little Brick school house on North Fir streets. Judges—John Ladd, E. S. Brasel, R. A. Masterton. Clerks—W. W. Randall, C. W. Van Fleet.

Said election will be held and conducted and the returns thereof filed as provided by law in the case of general city elections in said city.

The polls of said election will be opened at the hour of 8 o'clock a. m. and closed at the hour of 7 o'clock p. m. on said election day.

All qualified electors of said City will be permitted to vote at said election.

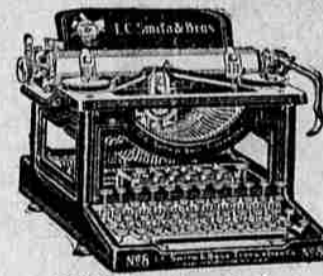
