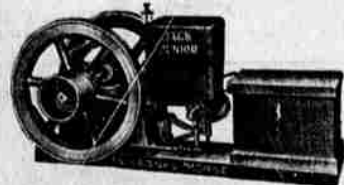

NEW CHIEF AT 1916'S HELM

"HAP" MOON CHOSEN CAPTAIN FOR COMING YEAR.

John (Hap) Moon stepped into the captaincy of the La Grande football team last Saturday evening after Captain Arthur Huff had vacated the strenuous position. The captaincy for the coming year was determined after some spirited running in which Jimmy Rosenburt, unanimously chosen center on the all-star eastern Oregon cast, ran neck and neck with the plunging backfielder, for several ballots. Mr. Moon finally broke the tie and captured the honors. The voting took place at an informal evening at which Coach and Mrs. Chas. Reynolds were at home to the team and substitutes. Felicitations were showered on the new captain, six of the seniors in the team left good wishes for their successors in the harness, and a generally pleasant evening marked the dropping of the curtain on 1915 football.

Jess Andrews was Saturday overlooked in the compilations of majority selections for Eastern Oregon football honors. He tied with the other four, making five men who each drew two votes for the flank position.

The utter absurdity of men trying to pick all-star teams for the state at large without having seen all teams play, or chief contenders at least, is shown in the fact that two would-be critics in the Willamette valley named Langrell of Baker for all-star star guard. He wasn't mentioned by his own coach or by four others who saw all eastern Oregon teams in action, yet over in Portland and Salem, and elsewhere, he is one of the two best guards in the state. Where do they get that stuff?

The church league games begin tonight at the Y again after a week's lay-off.

The M. I. A. team proved itself a coming volleyball team Saturday evening when it contested the businessmen's team at the Y. The businessmen took two out of three games straight, but in the second game the M. I. A. sixtet was up and a coming, driving the others off their feet at times but not consistently so. The M. I. A. lacked balance and only in spots could they show the desired strength. Another such contest as Saturday night, for experience sake, and addition of one or two better men and then look out for the M. I. A. WILLIAM BRUGGER DEAD.

Deceased Well Known Farmer of Elgin Section.

William Brugger, well known and prosperous young farmer residing on the Flat a few miles east of Elgin died suddenly Sunday night of valvular heart disease, states the Elgin Recorder.

The young man's death occurred a few minutes after 12:00 o'clock midnight and presumably after an illness lasting but a few seconds. Deceased had always resided with his mother and on that night retired for bed at 10:30 feeling in the best of health and in good spirits. Shortly after midnight his mother was awakened by two groans, followed immediately by a sound like that of one falling to the floor. She immediately rushed from her room to the door of the one occupied by her son and found him lying on the floor. An examination conveyed the sad fate of death. The aged mother telephoned to Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Hill, who live a short distance from the Brugger farm and who hurried to the scene as rapidly as possible. 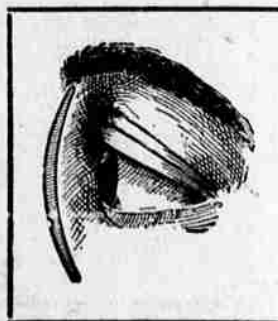

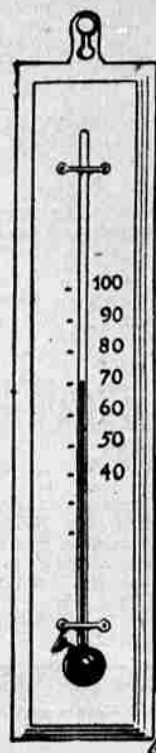
