BOYS KILL A BOB CAT.

Elgin Youths Put End to Animal Near City Limits.

An all white costume with a short jacket hung cape like and full from the shoulders is embroidered in silver thread and banded in white fox. The fur-finished full skirt has big silver embroidered pockets on each side. The high white boots are laced with silver and have a silver tassel nestling in their fur tops. A white fox turban, silver tasseled, tops the costume; and a huge round muff of the white fox with silver tassels, takes the wearer in hand. This costume of snow and silver is fit for the Ice Queen herself and no skittish skater could ever be a frost in it.

Gorgeous bags for skates, embroidered fur trimmed to match the gay sweaters hectic mufflers and puny ornate muls are a few of the accessories necessary for the complete skater this year. If a fair skater, thus heavily accoutred, can still skate and get away with it, she is in a class with Charlotte at the Hippodrome, that peerless pirouetter of the ice ballet.

Incidentally, the instruction of the ice ballet in several of the New York musical productions seems to have given a spirit to the gentle art of skating that may freeze out the dance. But beware if you seek to emulate Charlotte with too much excess baggage.

Union County Institute of W. C. T. U.

The W. C. T. U. of Union county held a very interesting and profitable institute at Elgin, Wednesday and Thursday in the Methodist church. In the address of welcome given by Mr. H. H. Weatherspoon he stated that the mayor and all the council of Elgin are temperance men. This is the first time in the history of Elgin that this could be said.

"The Aims and Achievements of the W. C. T. U." were well handled in a paper by Mrs. Belle Wright, of Union.

Mrs. Para Thornton gave a very interesting report of the State and National conventions which she attended. It was certainly inspiring to be one of the many hundred women delegates in the National convention. The W. C. T. U. is the largest organization of women in the world. One million women banded together, for the betterment of humanity.

Rev. W. G. Scates, of Baker, gave an inspiring talk on Christian citizenship.

At 3:45 a large body of school children marched in, and favored us with songs and recitations. In the evening the session was held in the city opera house which was well filled. We were entertained by instrumental and vocal solos after which a masterly address was given by Rev. W. G. Scates, on "How to save the Boy." He said "what we need is real stalwart men. That if fathers are what they should be, the boy problem will be solved."

Thursday morning the institute was opened at ten o'clock. After the devotional period the time was taken up with a question box, on different phases of the work and discussions. The afternoon session opened at 1:30. Prayer service was conducted by Rev. O. L. Curtis of Elgin. Prayers were especially offered for National Prohibition; for Christian people that they may pray and work aright; and that the members of congress may be men who fear God. "Cooperation with Sunday Schools"

was taken up and discussed. "Savings Banks in Schools" was ably handled by Aubrey G. Smith, principal of school at Union. He said that it was very necessary that the children of today be taught to be thrifty and that the Schools Savings banks would be a great factor in solving the problem.

Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe gave a splendid address on "Purity in Literature and Art."

A fine paper was read on "Medical Temperance and Narcotics," by Dr. C. H. Upton also an excellent paper on "Purity and Rescue Work" by Dr. Dora Underwood, Mrs. Mary D. Russell, the State Secretary was present through all the sessions, ever ready to give help and suggestions on all subjects referred to her.

Every session was well attended and it was quite gratifying to see that, although it was essentially a women's meeting, at every session there were a number of men present. The delegates were royally entertained by the people of Elgin. When the institute came to a close we all felt that the time had been pleasantly and profitably spent.
