STATE NEWS

Completion of Job Is Postponed.

Hood River, Or., Dec. 15.—Although the contract is completed with the exception of the application of a small quantity of oil, the Transfer & Livery company of this city, engaged during the past summer on a \$25,000 state highway road job near Maryhill, Wash., has postponed the completion of the work until spring weather comes. R. N. Young and Will Cass, representatives of the company, who have been engaged on the work, have returned to their homes here.

Breach of Promise Suit Is on Trial.

Albany, Or., Dec. 15.—A \$10,000 breach of promise suit came up today in the circuit court now in session in this city, in which Miss A. O. Hill of Dayton, Ohio, asks this amount from Arthur McDaniel of Brownsville, this county, alleging that McDaniel promised to marry her two months after January 8, 1915, but in February wrote her that he had changed his mind.

Mrs. Charles Schneider Dies.

Cornelius, Or., Dec. 15.—Mrs. Charles Schneider died at the home of her son Phillip, a farmer living near here, December 9. Services were held at the Catholic church here last Saturday and interment was had in the Fern Hill cemetery. Mrs. Schneider was born in Ohio, February 28, 1839. On May 2, 1863, she was married to Charles Schneider and they came to Oregon in 1893 and settled on the farm where she passed away. Mr. Schneider died January 6, 1913, and the following children survive: Mrs. V. Francks, south of Cornelius; Charles, of Eugene; Jacob of Leisville; Mrs. Kate Moorman of Michigan; Mrs. Will Hendricks, of Leisville; Mrs. J. A. Carter, of Portland, and Phillip, living on the home place.

Booster's Club Elects.

Cottage Grove, Or., Dec. 15.—At the Monday night meeting the local Commercial club elected new officers for the coming year. L. S. Hill, president of the Brown Lumber company, succeeded Elbert Bede as president; Ray Trask is the new vice president; Wash Harney is secretary and George M. Hall treasurer. The Commercial club is in a good condition and a great deal of substantial work has been accomplished this year.

Pardoned and Ordered to Leave.

Salem, Ore., Dec. 15.—In order that Louis Vargus and Ernest Albert Ward may be deported by the federal authorities Governor Withycombe has issued them conditional

pardons. The first named is a Mexican, and was convicted in Umatilla county for larceny from a store. Ward was convicted in Multnomah of assault with intent to rob. He is an Englishman. They will be deported in a few days to their respective countries, and the condition of their pardons is that they will forever remain outside the boundaries of the United States.

Catholic Mission Held.

Hood River, Or., Dec. 15.—With the Rev. Father Power of Portland, in charge, a mission is being held this week at St. Mary's Catholic church here. Father Power is delivering two sermons daily, one at 9 o'clock each morning and one at 7:30 each evening. At 4 o'clock each afternoon instruction is given to Catholic children of the community. From about a score of members nine years ago the Catholic church has grown to a membership of 250. Chapels are also maintained at Cascade Locks and at Barkdale.

Hood River Roses and Raspberries.

Hood River, Or., Dec. 15.—While numerous local people have been plucking roses from their out-of-doors gardens the past week, it was left to William Wilkinson, a Civil War veteran, to harvest a crop of December raspberries yesterday. The fruit is of the red variety and the berries are large and luscious.

Meat Inspection Ordinance in Court.

Salem, Or., Dec. 14.—The Sterrett & Oberle Packing company vs. the City of Portland will be the fourth case on the supreme court docket for the new year, and will be heard January 6. In this case the validity of the meat inspection ordinance of Portland is assailed. The lower court held it valid. It is estimated there will be approximately 175 cases on the new docket.

Non-Partisan Ticket Is Named.

Monmouth, Or., Dec. 15.—At a meeting held in the public hall Monday evening the following ticket for city officers was placed in nomination: For mayor, J. L. Murdock; councilmen, John Riddell and D. M. Hampton; recorder, Walter Brown; treasurer, William Smith. This ticket represents a non-partisan movement and is nominated on the platform of paved streets and improved roads. The election is to be held on December 20.

LEATON GETS PARDON.

Suicide of Eastside Mayor Throws Grave Doubt on Guilt of Recorder

Salem, Or., Dec. 15.—Governor Withycombe has issued a pardon to William J. Leaton, convicted in Coos county of the larceny of public moneys while city recorder of Eastside. He was paroled in December, 1914,

and the pardon restores him to full citizenship. The mayor of the town and Leaton both had access to the same safe, according to documents on file here, and five days after the money was stolen the mayor committed suicide. Leaton was convicted, and his friends have always contended that he was innocent of the offense.
