Terms for Naturalization.

An order was made last week by Judge J. W. Knowles appointing the first Monday in April and the third Monday in September as regular terms of the Circuit court for hearing naturalization petitions for admission to citizenship, says the Record-Chief. This is made necessary as the law provides that no hearings in naturalization matters can be heard less than 30 days before a general election.

Applications for citizenship must have their petitions, together with the affidavits of two witnesses, filed with the county clerk at least 90 days before April 3, 1916, to enable them to a hearing at that term of court. This fixes January 3 as the last day for filing such petitions. There are a number of residents of the county who expect to complete their naturalization this year, and if they wish

Dies After Fall Down a Stairway

Enterprise, Dec. 24.—Louis Runstadler died Sunday December 13, at the home of his son, Herman J. Runstadler, after he had fallen down a flight of stairs at his son's home on Hurricane creek. The father, who was 83 years old, had been quite ill with grip several days before the accident, and had had periods of delirium. While thus suffering, he arose at daylight, Saturday morning, December 11, and was walking on the second story of the house. He came to the head of the stairs and fell to the bottom before any one knew he was up.

He seemed to have lost control of his body by the fall for he did not move afterwards, although he had periods of consciousness. Death came Sunday at 2 p. m. The funeral was held on Wednesday, conducted by Rev. A. J. Adams of the Federated church, and burial was in Alder cemetery.

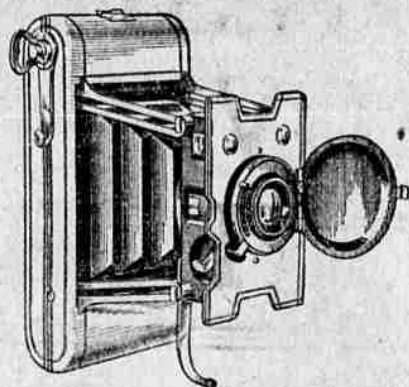
