Drainage Convention at O. A. C.

Corvallis, Ore., Dec. 21.—E. R. Jones, associate professor of the soils and land drainage at the University of Wisconsin, will attend the convention of the Oregon Drainage association for a two days' session at the Oregon Agricultural college, on January 4.

The drainage problem has become an important one in many sections of Oregon, and a recent law which allows the formation of extensive drainage system will be discussed by representatives of the various districts that have been created. Hood River, Ore., Dec. 21.—Following letters from C. W. Birds Driven to Shelter.

Hood River, Dec. 21.—Following the recent snows thousands of small birds flocked to the orchards of the valley. Since the practice of clean cultivation was discontinued, weeds grow in profusion in the orchard fields. The seeds of these, especially the lamb's quarter weed, furnishes food for the feathered visitors. Scores of Chinese pheasants, too, have come down from the wooded ranges, and are making themselves at home on the farms.
