FARRAR AT THE ARCADE

Geraldine Farrar, the celebrated Prima Donna of the Metropolitan Opera Company, will make her debut to photo-dramatic audiences in a film version of her most famous opera, "Carmen"—produced under the personal direction of Cecil B. de Mille, for the Jesse L. Lasky Feature Play Company, at the Arcade today and tonight only.

There will be special music for the firms in the production of "Carmen."

The version of "Carmen" used in this Paramount Picture is founded on the story by Prosper Merimee, and shows Carmen as a half-wild, fascinating creature—a gypsy by birth—and living with a band of smugglers in the mountains near the coast of Spain.

The smugglers are foiled in their attempt to get their illegal goods into the little town by Don Jose—an officer in the regiment stationed there.

Carmen is sent by Pastia, the leader of the smugglers and the local tavern keeper, to fascinate Don Jose and make him forget his duties and give the smugglers an opportunity to bring their goods into the city.

Carmen secures work in a tobacco factory near the city wall, to account for her presence near Don Jose, and it is also announced that she will dance at the tavern in the evenings.

The night Carmen dances in the tavern, she is the center of attraction. She is wooed unsuccessfully by morales, a brother officer of Don Jose's, and also by Escamillo—a young Toreador on his way to Seville to enter the bull ring there.

Escamillo has loved Carmen for a long time, but she, while attracted to him, has clung to her liberty. Escamillo asks Carmen to accompany him to Seville, and she is tempted to listen to him, but Pastia reminds her that her beauty is at present for Don Jose and she must carry through their plans.

Don Jose, after Carmen's wild, sensuous dance, loses his heart to her; and that night when she passes by the breach in the wall where he is on guard, he follows her off while the smugglers enter the city.

Ford Plan Defended.

Washington, D. C. Dec. 4.—In an

article under date of December 25, Mr. George E. Miller, Washington correspondent of the Detroit News, calls attention to the deliberate, concerted effort upon the part of many big newspapers of the country to cast odium upon the trip of Henry Ford to Europe in an effort for peace.

The Detroit News is one of the few big papers in the United States that have shown a spirit of fairness in the matter. There is nothing in the News the spirit of malicious misrepresentation, coloring and deliberate falsehood so much in evidence in certain New York papers and in papers of smaller cities that ape the big city's news methods—all apparently set upon a determined effort to plunge the United States into the great war, and to discredit any effort that might hasten the conflict. Mr. Miller's story tells some of the motives behind the attacks on Mr. Ford.

The article says:—A persistent one could say wilful misconception and misstatement of Henry Ford's peace expedition is carried in the press of the east and also brought across the ocean in the British censored cables.

Ford has deserted and the expedition is a failure, is the statement, accompanied with editorial comment in which Mr. Ford is patronizingly characterized as a generous soul but ignorant.

The kindest thing some of these publications find to say about him is that he is a rainbow chaser with a good purpose and a poor plan for its accomplishment.

The New York papers almost without exception misrepresented the character of the Ford enterprise from the first. For this Mr. Ford was himself to blame to some extent as he failed to issue a comprehensive statement of his plan in the beginning.

Newspapers disposed to be hostile towards any step to end the war took advantage of this to ridicule the expedition and their example has been very largely followed on both sides of the ocean.

The papers controlled by the steel and munition interests have been the most persistent in declining to print the facts about the nature of Mr. Ford's project.

Yet it would not have been difficult for them to ascertain that this big body of people carried abroad in the Oscar II was not the real peace commission to carry out Mr. Ford's purpose.

Though stated over and over again that the ship was chartered to attract the attention of the world to the peace plan, and for no other purpose, this fact has been studiously ignored.
