GURDANE NEW CHIEF.

Succeeds Manning of Pendleton—Attorneyship Not Cleared.

Pendleton, Jan. 6.—Tom B. Gurdane, former chief of the Pendleton police department under the administrations of Mayors Fee and Murphy was last evening appointed to his old position to succeed Alex Manning the present incumbent. The appointment was made by the new council and mayor at the first session after caucus earlier in the evening had determined that the majority sentiment was for Gurdane.

In the same way City Recorder Thomas Fitz Gerald was retained in office and Dr. H. T. Hattery appointed city physician. Mayor Best announced at the meeting that, inasmuch as no agreement could be reached on a city attorney, the present incumbent, Charles H. Carter, had kindly consented to act until his successor was named. No appointments of city engineer or street commissioner

er were made last evening. The caucus was held behind closed doors earlier in the evening but reports of the discussion there have leaked out. It is said that on the first ballot on the city attorneyship, five votes were cast for J. Roy Raley, city attorney under Murphy, and three for Alger Fee. It is said that Mayor Best announced that he absolutely would not stand for Raley for the reason that that attorney had been actively opposed to him during the mayoralty campaign. Despite this announcement the second ballot stood the same and it was decided to permit the present city attorney to remain for the time being.

Recorder Fitz Gerald received the tribute of a unanimous vote on the first ballot. Dr. Hattery was nominated for the position of city physician by Mayor Best and received six of the eight votes, according to reports. The other two were cast for the present incumbent, Dr. I. U. Temple.

The council chamber was crowded last evening by people eager to hear the new appointments. Mayor Best, by reason of his recent auto accident, wore a bandage over one eye. He did not have his committee appoint-

ents made and, in consequence, such business as came up was laid on the table until the committees are named. The monthly and annual report took up the greater part of the meeting.
