**Wallowa Ice Crop Harvest.**  
J. L. Maxwell has had a crew of men and teams busy putting up ice for next summer, says the Wallowa Sun. The ice houses are pretty well filled at this time with ice ranging from 10 to 18 inches thick. There have been between 200 and 300 tons put in the various ice houses.

**Horse Left to Die in Storm.**  
Haines, Ore., Jan. 7.—(Special)—Haines is up in arms over a case of cruelty to a dumb animal that came to light last evening. It was reported to Marshal Heninger early this morning that a horse had been abandoned by its driver and left to die in the snow, about four miles from here. Accompanied by Dr. Biswell, Mr. Heninger went to the scene, where the animal was found almost buried in the snow and almost dead. The marshal shot the horse and proceeded to make an investigation, which resulted in discovering the identity of the man who abandoned the horse, when the animal was taken sick in the storm and unable to proceed. The marshal has his evidence well in shape and an arrest and prosecution will follow within the next few days.

There have been several recent cases of cruelty to animals in Haines and vicinity, and it is proposed to make an example of one or two as a warning to others. The case cited is one of the worst that has ever been brought to the notice of the people

**No Affidavits Required.**

Salem, Or., Jan. 7.—Attorney General Brown has rendered an opinion to the effect that under the prohibition law it is not necessary for a retail druggist to furnish a wholesale druggist with an affidavit before the latter is authorized to sell to the retailer ethyl alcohol.

"Our law makes no such provision nor is there any suggestion contained anywhere within the act that it is necessary for the retail druggist to file an affidavit with the wholesale druggist," he said. "Such retail druggist, however, is required to file an affidavit with the common carrier before such common carrier is authorized to deliver alcohol to the consignee, whether such consignee is a druggist or otherwise."

**Near-Beer Is Ousted.**

Centralia, Wash., Jan. 7.—Prosecuting Attorney C. D. Cunningham yesterday issued an order prohibiting the sale of near-beer in Lewis county. Chief of Police McGrall immediately notified local dealers, while Sheriff Foster notified the dealers throughout the county.
