**SPOKANE'S QUIET DAY.**

No Arrests Made in City for Twenty-Four Hour Period.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 8.—Spokane's police force is tired, suffering with ennui. An entire 24-hour day the bluecoats put in this week without making an arrest.

According to oldtimers on the force, that is a world's record for a city of 120,000 people. Along with all other places in the states of Washington, Oregon and Idaho, Spokane came under prohibition rule January 1. The day without an arrest was the third week-day of the dry regime.

A week of prohibition has given business men an opportunity to study the first effects of the new condition. One hundred and fifty-two saloons ceased dispensing liquors January 1, but in the close-in business district no change is perceptible. Many of the saloons were converted over night into soft-drink establishments, lunch rooms or pool halls. In the best portion of the business district the rental situation has not been affected.

South and east bound freight trains have been carrying loads of gentlemen of leisure who have been in the habit of spending their winters at Spokane's expense.

Bank deposits January 6 totaled \$35,925,413.91, two million dollars in excess of any previous record.

At present the most popular substitute for beer is carbonated fizz, a product being manufactured by a reformed brewery. It is drawn from the tap, it foams enticingly and looks like beer. In fact, it is made of the same ingredients that compose beer, excepting alcohol.

One large brewery at Republic,

Wash., is being converted into a dairy plant at an expense of \$25,000.

Under the Washington law, however, residents are still able to get small supplies of liquors for their own consumption. Every 20 days they can get for 25 cents a permit from the county auditor enabling them to have shipped in 12 quarts of beer or a half gallon of other liquor.

**MACOMB TO FACE TRIAL.**  
Murderer of L. Goul Indicted—Copperfield Arson Suspect not Indicted.

Baker, Jan. 8.—Final report was made last evening by the grand jury, which has been in session since Monday. Seven true bills and six not true bills of indictment were returned.

Chief interest centered in the case of James Macomb, who was indicted for the murder of Leonard Goul in this city. He was indicted for murder in the second degree, the only possible indictment under the law, for as the statute now stands conviction for first degree murder would not be punishable, as the penalty was removed when capital punishment was abolished.

True bills were returned against James Pruitt and Blanche Pruitt, charging extortion. George L. Taylor was indicted for larceny, alleged to have been committed at Haines. True bills were also returned against Fred Reno for assault on Eleanor Storie, a school teacher at Weatherby, and against Wm. Erby, Neal Hickman and Tom Mylin for robbing A. McAdams of 80. Two other true bills were returned, but the party against whom directed is not yet in custody.

There was much surprise over the failure of the grand jury to indict Jim Wharton, especially among those who heard the testimony at the preliminary hearing. Wharton was charged with setting the Copperfield fire, which destroyed several stores and other buildings. Seventeen or 18 witnesses were examined in this case. Not true bills were also returned against John Meade, the assailant of C. O. Kaester on an O.-W. freight train; Mike Anderson, who it was charged, attempted to shoot Marshal Foreman at Halfway; George Irvin, assailant of Marshal Heninger of Haines; Hunter Davey, larceny, and A. J. Davis, charged with breaking jail at Huntington.

Knight and Carl Hallgarth, who have been in the business for several years.

Several men and teams are engaged in the work, but the season will be somewhat shorter than usual owing to the fact that heretofore saloons used a large bulk of the total output and these will not have to be supplied this year. Meat markets, and soda fountains are storing the larger portion of this season's crop.

**Heaviest Rails Ever Made.**  
The Lehigh Valley R. R. has ordered some steel rails that will weigh 136 pounds to the yard. These are the heaviest rails ever rolled for a steam railroad, it is said, and the railroad men the nation over will watch with interest the tests to which they are subjected.

At the rate the weight of rails is increasing there is no telling when the limit will be reached. Twenty years ago few railroads had rails as heavy as 60 pounds. Most of them had 40-pound rails. Some roads in the South and West still had iron rails.

Now there are various roads with rails of 100 pounds or a little heavier. In a few years we may see the 150 or 200-pound rail.
