New York, Jan. 11.—To battling Levinsky and Ted Lewis, two Hebrew fighting men, goes the honor of beating a pair of tough pugilistic nuts by running away from them. Levinsky outpointed Jim Flynn, the Pueblo fireman, in a great bout recently by this unique style of warfare. Lewis rained gloves on Ritchie like gravel against a bay window, stepping backward throughout the fight.

Levinsky was the first to copy the style of Grand Duke Nicholas. When Flynn pursued him, striving to bring his heavy artillery against the enemy's inner works, Levinsky thumped him plentifully, piling up a liberal margin of points. Incidentally he made an awful mess of Flynn's comeliness, which was not a thing to boast of at the outset. The fighting firemen simply couldn't bring his brawny arms into play. The effort put him within the enemy's range.

Lewis got himself a good measure of praise for beating Ritchie. The fight was Willie's first as a genuine welterweight and it cost him a lot of pulchritude, for Lewis slathered gloves all over his countenance with his back-away campaign. Lewis now has bloomed with a claim for the welterweight championship and though there are plenty of contenders, Packy McFarland, retired, is considered the best. Maybe Packy can be forced into the ring with Lewis now that interest in the welters has been revived, but if the offers are not ample enough to tempt him, Lewis' friends foresee little difficulty for him in his accession to an unclouded welterweight title.

SHEVLIN LEFT \$3,500,000.

Most of Football Star's Insurance Goes to His Firms.

Minneapolis, Jan. 10.—The will of Thomas L. Shevlin, former Yale football star, who died here last week after a brief illness, was filed for probate today. His entire estate, estimated at \$3,500,000, is left to his widow and two children.

The executors, who were his business associates in the lumber business, are named as trustees. A large part of the estate is placed in trust until the children reach the age of thirty, and then it is to be divided equally between them. Mrs. Shevlin will receive an annual income of \$60,000 in addition to money from certain holdings.

Although Mr. Shevlin's life was insured heavily, only \$25,000 is payable to the widow, \$1,500,000 going to two companies of which he was head.

SHIP OF MYSTERY.

Gordon Castle Also Has Diamonds, Silver and Radium.

Baltimore, Jan. 10.—The mystery concerning the British steamship, Gordon Castle, in port from South Africa, was raised somewhat today when it was learned that the cargo included diamonds, silver, gold ore and radium, all of which are mined in the British South African colonies.

It was also said that 250 packing boxes filled with gold and silver bullion were taken from the vessel today and shipped by express to Montreal.

The Gordon Castle came to Baltimore from Bombay. She was conveyed from Cape Town by British warships and took a roundabout course. She is under heavy guard at her pier.
