HINTS TO WATER USERS.

To prevent service pipes from freezing in cold weather, shut off stop and waste valves and open all faucets so air can enter and let all water drain out of pipes. Stop and waste valves can always be found near fixtures or in basement of houses. A little care in the above will save a plumber's bill and inconvenience to water users, besides considerable waste of water.

Last winter there was no snow to protect water mains, while this winter the ground is only frozen from two to six inches under the snow and there have been no cases of frozen mains so far as investigated this winter.—L. M. HOYT, Water Superintendent. Adv. 1-18-16.
