

EASTERN OREGON FARMER'S AND HOME-MAKER'S CONFERENCE WEEK

The following contains all the information and the program for the Eastern Oregon Farmers' and Home-Makers' week which convenes in La Grande next Monday, viz:

The instructional work outlined for this meeting we believe is of sufficient value to the people of EASTERN OREGON to justify their coming to La Grande for Farmers' and Home-makers' Week. The lectures and demonstrations have been especially selected to meet the problems of this country. There will be something for the farmer, his good wife and the family. Townspeople should find it profitable to take in this week of instruction and entertainment. We invite and urge all who are interested in the welfare and progress of this part of the state to come.

Entertainment—The people of La Grande have kindly consented to turn the city over to us for this week. The entertainment feature of the program will be well taken care of by town-folks. They have assured us music and other entertainment for General Assembly meetings. We are sure this part of the meeting will not be lacking in any detail.

Accommodations—Hotels and rooming houses will take care of out of town people at reasonable rates. A number of rooms with private families will be available at rates not to exceed 50c per day. Railway Rates—The Railways of Eastern Oregon have granted a rate of one fare and a third under the certificate plan. Every evening at 7:30 in the same building similar programs will be given. Moving pictures, readings and music are some of the features for the evening sessions.

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MADE LONG TRIP

State Treasurer Returns From Visit
to Eastern Penitentiary

Salem Ore., Jan. 19.—State Treas-
urer Thomas B. Kay returned to

Salem Saturday evening after a 5,000
mile trip east during which time he
says he was never out of sight of the
snow and he expected to find it warm
in the Willamette valley when he re-
turned but the snow arrived before
he did. Mr. Kay went from Salem to
St. Paul Minn., and while in that
state visited the famous Stillwater
prison which he pronounces to be the
finest penal institute in the United
States if not in the world. Not only
is the structure one of the best but
the management and general conditions
are above the usual run of state insti-
tutions.

The prisoners work in mills turning
out binding twine and also several
kinds of farm machinery. Last year
managers of the prison turned over to
the state a clear profit of \$350,000 for
the year's work. This sum of \$350,000
was left over after all appropriations
had been paid back, and after the up-
keep, maintenance, salaries and all
other expenses had been deducted.

About 1,000 men are doing time at
Stillwater and in the reformatory
which is separate about 700 more are
confined. The younger prisoners and
those who committed minor offenses
are separated from the older prisoners
and confined in the reformatory. The
prisoners are paid 25 cents to \$1.25
for working in the prison plants.
