FLOUR GOES POINT HIGHER

CELERY PRICES SPURT WITH RAPIDITY.

Onions, Too, Take Upward Trend—Eggs Holding Own Well.

Flour prices are going up; so are several other commodities, but in most instances it is rather the luxuries class that has increased rather than the necessities. Eggs are holding their own remarkably well, notwithstanding that it is past time for eggs to hold their holiday scale. Celery is now selling at 15 cents straight and that scarcely leaves a margin at all for the dealer. Onions have gone to three cents a pound.

Many Lines Strong. Oranges and lemons are of great strength. All wheat products such as cereals are advancing, coffee will likely advance, and in fact a dozen different food stuffs are either advancing or showing such strength that an advance can be predicted with certainty.

Eggs All Year Round

To secure early hatching of eggs, it is necessary to make the proper selection of hens. In breeding one should select for longevity, use late moulters, select early producing pullets, use fall and winter layers and late retires, select mature birds.

We believe it pays to keep pure bred poultry because they are more reliable in breeding, greater egg producers, superior in meat quality, mixed breeds tend to revert. Pure bred first cost of starting is but little more and it costs no more to keep them. One should secure better results in feeding, better hatching quality, less brood-size, shape and color of egg more uniform, can sell eggs and stock for breeding has greater selling value, can start up-to-date, great pleasure as well as profit.

Laying hens should be kept warm and protected from storms. We recommend the open front house with perfectly tight back, sides and roof so there will be no draught upon the birds.

To keep hens happy they should have about a foot of wheat or straw at the bottom of the house at which the scratch feed should be thrown. The dropping board should be cleaned at least twice a week and still better once a day. It is necessary to frequently clean and spray the nests and walls, roosts, cracks and crevices of the whole building with some good liquid lice killer. There are several good ones on the market; and dust insect powder among the feathers of the birds, stroking the feathers forward so as to get the powder to the skin. Vermin weaken birds, and lay them open to attacks of disease and are indirectly the cause of more loss from death, egg production and flesh than any other cause.

The birds should not be frightened by strangers and dogs, etc., entering their premises.

The first feed should be given about

7 o'clock in the morning, and should be thrown in the straw in the hen house so the hens will be kept busy scratching for an hour or more. This is called scratch feed No. 1.

Dry mash should be kept in slatted hoppers in such a way that they cannot throw it out and this feed should be kept before them all the time.

The second scratch feed should be given about 3 o'clock in the afternoon and should be thrown in the hen house so as to make them work for it.

Scratch feed No. 1 should consist of the following:

Wheat, one part; oats, one part.
 Scratch feed No. 2 consists of the following:

Sifted cracked corn (coarser part), two parts; wheat, one part; oats, one part.

The dry mash should consist of:

Wheat bran, three parts; wheat middings, two parts; ground oats, two parts; corn meal, one part; cottonseed meal, one part; meat scrap, one part. Thoroughly mixed.

In addition to this skim milk, clabber or buttermilk, should be given if the same can be procured. If the birds cannot get green feed they should be given once a day, cabbage, mangles, sprouted oats or any other green feed.
