The event will be the twenty-four orchestra concert of the local society, Prof. Edgar Fisher is again the director of the club this year, and the concert this afternoon promises to be well up to the high standard which the organization has set in the past.

Prof. Elias Blum and Miss Harriet Young of Pendleton have been chosen to assist this year, and that fact has lent added interest to the concert. Prof. Blum, head of the Whitman conservatory, needs no introduction to the music loving public here. He will give three vocal selections.

Miss Young will be remembered here, by many, she having been a student of Whitman conservatory several years ago. She has recently completed several years of study in Europe, and is at present teaching in Pendleton. She will give a number of piano numbers.

Then, after the concert, the same paper remarks:
The twenty-fourth orchestra concert of the Symphony club was given yesterday in the Keylor Grand Theatre, Elias Blum of Whitman Conservatory and Miss Harriet Young of Pendleton, assisting. The orchestra now numbers 33 players and their improvement in the last year is quite marked. The wood, wind and brass instruments are decidedly better, the toute ensemble being so good that it no longer is necessary for the director to put forth such strenuous efforts as formerly in order to get desired results.

The very beautiful G minor symph-

ony Mozart was well played, and with good interpretation, the orchestra being at its best in this number. The ever lovely "Traumerei" was charmingly played, and "The Hungarian Dance" of Brahms was played with a dash and fineness of more experienced players. The program as a whole was well received by the audience, and the director deserves much praise for his patient and untiring work.

Mr. Elias Blum was in excellent voice, the Siegmund "Love Song" being especially appealing. He graciously responded to an encore with the charming "Irish Love Song," by Lang. Mrs. Edgar Fisher appeared as accompanist and as usual did splendid work, her playing adding much to the rendition of the songs. vantage in that the instrument was Miss Young played at a disadvantage in that the instrument was entirely too small for the theatre and by rights a canvass should be stretched across the top of the stage to prevent the sounds going up into the wings. Her runs were clear and especially delicate. In the Schumann "Romance" she was quite at home, but her best work was in the Debussy Toccata, making the close of a most attractive group.
