me, if I remember, by Mr. Allen, your county assessor, and in a letter, of which I have a copy, which Mr. Rudd wrote, for certain changes in the Boundary Bill and which I had some trouble in getting changed being at the late hour it was.

"I think this has answered your first question which you asked, 'Who asked to have these boundaries changed in this manner'.

Your second question "Why was the matter kept secret until the present time?" I will have to answer by saying that yourself, as well as a great many others in Wallowa and Union counties, were on my mailing list and should have received copies of all bills pertaining to my district, but in this particular one I remember quite well in sending some twenty extra copies to different ones in Union and Wallowa counties, although I do not remember who they were, but do know that the house calendars were kept at the County Clerk's office very near continuously and if not so the copies were there every four or five days and this Bill is mentioned in the Calendar as House Bill Number 142, introduced by myself, at the request, as I have said before, of the Assessor of Wallowa county, Mr. Allen, and very plainly states that it is to change the boundaries between Umatilla, Union and Wallowa counties, so I do not think, nor do I know that it has ever been a secret, and will say as far as I am concerned that it never has been and if there was any 'catch' in it, it certainly was kept from me, and as I did with all other bills when there was no complaint against the Bill or remonstrance why I certainly supposed that it was alright and suited the masses interested.

"Of course I voted for the Bill for I introduced it myself. I did not push the Bill to any extent as it was not necessary for the committee on counties examined it according to the map, which I am going to return by today's mail to the County Clerk's office at Enterprise for the convenience of the public, so they may readily see that I had no personal interest in the matter other than being asked by a resident of the county to introduce the Bill, the same as I did with a great many others which were sent to me, in fact, everyone which I received.

"I am certain that if this Bill was introduced to defraud that it can be remedied and if to defraud Wallowa county (out of any assessable property) I will certainly take it upon myself, if I am well and living at the time the next session of the Legislature convenes, to see that it is changed back to where it was.

"The copies of these letters I have mentioned are in the office here and will be sent to anyone for the asking, so that I may make myself clear to all who are concerned.

"Hoping that this is not as bad as you think it is, as myself and family are financially interested in the assessable property of Wallowa county to an extent that is possibly greater than the majority of the tax-payers of the county, and you could readily see that it would be folly for me to introduce or allow a bill of this kind to go through had I known that the asser-

tions that you make are correct. Awaiting your reply in this matter, I am,

Sheep and Cattle Men Settle Old Feud

(By United Press.)
El Paso, Tex., Jan. 25.—The ancient feud between cattle and sheep men, dating back to the old days of the open range when the rival stockmen were wont to shoot on sight, was officially declared off today. The American Live Stock association and the National Sheep Growers' association began their annual conventions here together. About 10,000 delegates are in attendance, representing every feeding district west of Chicago. The cattle men will make a fight for an open market and against light competition by the packers. Practically

every state organization already is pledged to back this campaign. The entertainment program will include roping, branding and riding contests, afternoons at the Juarez races, bull fights, open air barbecues and military drills at Fort Bliss. The conventions will last three days.

Professors to Be Absent This Year.

Cambridge, Jan. 25.—Several of Harvard's most prominent professors will be absent next year at the opening of the 1916-17 college year. Wallace Clement Sabine of the department of physics has been appointed exchange professor to France for the next year. Kuno Francke has been granted a leave of absence for the whole of the next college year and Walter F. Dearborn, for the first half of it. Albert A. Shapira has been appointed assistant in anatomy and

Samuel E. Morrison, instructor in history, Frank J. Smiley, assistant in botany, has resigned. In response to a demand for military instruction, a course in military medicine in the graduate school of medicine has been established with Maj. Weston P. Chamberlain, U. S. A., as lecturer. His work will begin this February. Gifts amounting to \$43,987.84, of which the largest single items were \$10,000 from the estate of J. Arthur Beebe for the general purposes of the university and \$10,000 from Francis W. Hunnewell for the Collis P. Huntington Memorial Hospital endowment fund, were received.

BOUNDARY BILL EXPLAINED

W. Al Jones Tells How Measure Was Introduced

In a letter to L. Couch, of Wallowa, Representative W. Al Jones, tells how it came about that the bill for the change of boundary between Union and Wallowa counties was passed at the last session of the legislature. Mr. Jones says:

"I have yours of January 7th and was indeed surprised to learn that the Boundary Bill, 'House Bill Number 214,' was a new thing to the residents of Wallowa county, and especially as I had always supposed that it had been up before the Court while you were a member, as I had heard it talked about during my campaign in a great many places, the reason being for a change was that the boundary line of Wallowa county, especially along the west and south, being the Grande Ronde and Minam rivers, was so irregular and crooked that it would cut into and back again in certain forties and there was a great deal of land which was not assessed in either county on account of same. Another thing was the assessors of both counties asked for same, so I was told, along section lines for the convenience that it might make. They gave me to understand that there was about an even break both ways by that according to the new boundary line, as I could very well see, as also did the committee on Counties when they examined the Bill, that it would be easier to assess the land and of course there would naturally not be any over-looked in the assessment.

"I am very sorry to know that Wallowa hill was, by this Bill, made a part of Wallowa county, if such is the case, but according to my map, which was sent to me by Mr. Allen, the assessor, I can not see it that way although you are better acquainted with that immediate part of the county, and I may be twisted on my directions. It does not run in the change a full section or very near it west from the junction of the Wallowa and Minam rivers, but thought it run north of the Wallowa county hill, although the map shows it takes in Minam townsite.

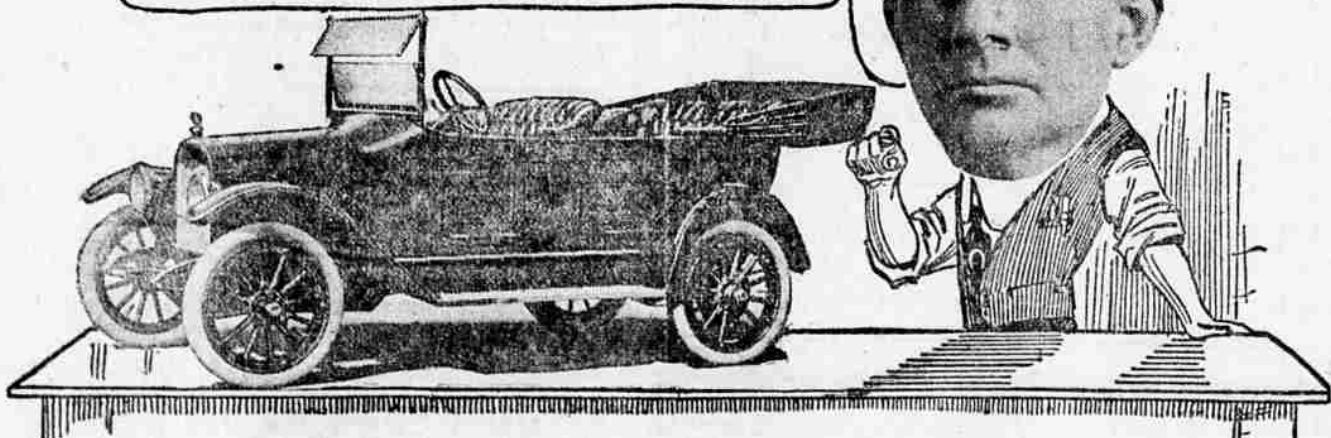
