ASSESSMENT ROLLS READY

TURNED OVER TO TAX COLLECTOR TO DAY.

Assessor Offers Reward for Error in Extension and Tables.

Union county's assessment rolls are now tax rolls. Today an Observer representative found Assessor Couch and Deputy Alexander completing the 1916 assessment rolls which will be turned over to the tax collector today, thereby becoming the 1916 tax rolls. Personal inspection of the rolls shows neatness and accuracy in every detail. Assessor Couch has offered a reward for any mistake found in compilations and extension of levies. The assessor and his deputy will immediately begin preparation for the 1916 assessments which will begin March 1st. Mr. Couch says his aim in the work has been to equalize all assessment and for the coming year, with the co-operation of the tax payer, and from the fact of his better knowledge of the work, hopes to be able to accomplish still more along those lines and will, and is, anxious at all times that adjustment of assessments in his hands, be given due consideration and to hear any complaint from any taxpayer that thinks his property is not valued equal to that of other property. Then if the two cannot agree, the Board of Equalization meets the second Monday in September and will give attention to all complaints coming before them.

Mr. Couch further stated today that many points the new present tax laws are good and under no consideration should they be disturbed while in his opinion there are a few changes necessary for the betterment of conditions. These will be considered and discussed at the annual assessors' meeting to be held in Salem next month with a view of getting these changes properly before the people and the legislature.

While Mr. Couch has not announced his candidacy for re-election, he admitted today that if the people thought he had done his work well and accurately, and had looked after the best interests of the people and done general satisfaction of the taxpayers he will be a candidate to succeed himself.

MANY CATTLE RECOVERED

Cattle and Horse Raisers Association Getting Good Results

Baker, Jan. 25.—The fiscal year of the Cattle and horse raisers' Association of Oregon, which closes with the current month, has been one of great success for the organization, which was instituted by local stockmen three years ago. In the recovery of stray cattle a great success was recorded no less than 250 strays being reported to the association and 150 returned to their owners.
