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PROPOSED LAW ON HOMESTEADS

CONGRESSMAN SINNOTT HAS
BILL FOR CHANGE
Would Give Entrymen Longer Time
To Establish Claim

Representative Sinnott has introduced a bill in congress which is designed to give a homesteader more time in which to complete the establishing of a home, and incidentally to bring under development many millions of acres of land in Oregon that are now non productive.

Mr. Sinnott's bill provides for "deferred residence homesteads; given the entryman three years from the date of filing in which to establish residence; requires erection of habitable house upon the land during the first three years; requires that five acres shall be in cultivation the second year, 10 acres the third, 15 acres the fourth, and 20 acres the fifth year, and until final proof for 160-acre homesteads—double the amount for 320-acre homesteads; requires five years' residence, but permits the usual five months absence each year, and extends the provisions of the act to all unperfected homestead entries that are open within one year from the passage of the bill.

Under the present homestead law there is little inducement to undertake to convert arid acreage at high altitudes into cultivated farms, but if a homesteader has a chance to work for wages during the first two years while he is getting his place fenced, building his shack and placing part of it under cultivation, he

can submit and improve his land to the point where it will support him. Without this opportunity he is helpless, as it is practically impossible on such lands that are now available for any one to get a homestead in shape where it will support a family unless the entryman has sufficient funds to support himself the first two years.

\$2.35. The plant food value of common wheat straw is \$1.75 per ton. By applying in the fall and discing, and then plowing under in the Spring, straw manure can be very successfully used.

Manures can be preserved easily in this region by building a tight board fence eight feet high, conserving juices. Handling the fresh manure directly to the field is also an excellent way.

On dry farming land less manure is available, and must be used in thinner dressings, either 12 or 13 tons to the acre over winter wheat or in light applications on the stubble and then disced in.

The value of green manures on irrigated lands here has not yet been recognized. A good green manure crop of vetch and rye adds as much nitrogen to the soil as four times as much of barnyard manure and is a quick way of bringing up the fertility.

The most essential of all means of fertility restoration is the crop rotation. On irrigated lands this is simple, as both alfalfa and clover as well as other legumes are readily grown. On drylands, rotations with legumes have not been so easy. The Oregon experiment station has solved this problem for methods of growing two legumes; field peas and alfalfa on a 12 inch rainfall have been work-

ed out successfully. It has been fully demonstrated that field peas can be grown more profitably even than wheat on dry farming. Examples of the best rotations with these crops for dry farming of this region as follows:

A
1st year, summer-fallow. 2nd year wheat. 3rd field peas.

B
1st year, summer-fallow. 2nd, wheat. 3rd, field peas. 4th, field peas. 5th, alfalfa. 6th, alfalfa. 7th, alfalfa. 8th, alfalfa. One field.

The peas and alfalfa both are grown in rows and pastured off with hogs and sheep. The lambs and pigs are grown on the alfalfa and fattened on the peas—thus no other feeding is required. Both of these crops can be grown without summer-fallow with your rainfall here—thus doing away to a certain extent with this costly practice. The effect upon the fertility of the dry farm of these rotations is obvious restoring the nitrogen and humus supply and increasing the wheat yields. Details as to methods and results with these two crops may be learned from Bulletin 119 issued at Corvallis.
