

# STRONG FIVE GOING GOOD

## CALDWELL QUINTET MEETS DE- CISIVE DEFEAT.

Game Full of Ginger and Fast Play-  
ing Is the Consequence.

With her offensive machinery work-  
ing like a clock, and her defense  
tightened up so that it was in the  
best shape it has been any time this  
year, M. I. A. snowed under the Col-  
lege of Idaho quintet from Caldwell  
last night at the Y. M. C. A. gymna-  
sium in a manner entirely complete.  
The avalanche which struck the vis-  
itors was as thorough as the snow-  
storm without doors.  
The collegians lost out in the first  
part of the game when the home team  
ran away with a job of field goals,  
closing the first half 32 to five against  
the visitors. That the playing of the  
collegians as a whole was off color  
last night was shown at the beginning  
of the second semester when they ran  
the score from five to 22 in less than  
five minutes. During that period of  
the game, La Grande's defense

crumbled and the offensive toppled  
with it—but the M. I. A. rehabilitated  
their machinery before it was too late,  
and, once re-started, the visitors had  
no further chance than they did in the  
first half.  
The difference between the two  
teams is marked—Peterson, Larsen  
and Ferrin are as letter perfect in  
shooting goals as the visiting team  
is as team work on the floor—but  
spectacular team work doesn't put the  
ball in the basket, which is the mea-  
sure of deciding who wins. If La  
Grande's team was apt in passing the  
ball and dribbling as, for instance,  
Paine, of Caldwell, they would have  
a team par excellence. But as noted,  
victories are not decided by specu-  
lar passing—it's goals that does the  
business. Petersen re-proved that he  
was "a bear" at taking the ball on  
the run and hoisting a basket. His  
total points excelled all others with  
Larsen a close second. Ferrin, a regu-  
lar for the first year, shot four dif-  
ficult goals, and was very much in  
evidence in getting the ball around.  
Bean was back in harness, and with  
Earl Rosenbaum, smothered the vis-  
iting forwards with careful guarding.  
Paine and Turner were the visitor's  
best at traction.  
The game was fast, void of inten-  
tional roughing, and that being true,  
Referee Fisk let them go at top speed  
with the result that the fans saw a  
real basketball game in spite of the  
lopsided score of the game. It wasn't

patterned after the new rules, by any  
means, but was an old fashioned  
style of play in which everybody was  
on his toes and going hard. It was  
good entertainment. Referee Fisk  
was very fair—favoring the home  
team if anything in the favor line was  
done at all. He called five fouls on the  
visitors and seven on the home team.

## FILMS ARE TABOO Can No Longer be Carried on Pas- senger Trains Say Orders.

As a further step to safeguard the  
life of passengers from accident,  
Western railroads on the first of Feb-  
ruary, will prohibit the carrying of  
motion picture films in passenger  
cars. The celluloid of which the films  
are made is a highly combustible sub-  
stance and the fear that a chance con-  
tract with fire might end in disaster.  
This action follows that already  
taken by railroads of the country lo-  
cated in the East and Middle West.  
A passenger on a suburban train run-  
ning out of Chicago recently carried  
into the combination smoking and  
baggage car four reels of motion  
picture films and placed it on the  
floor between the seats. In some way  
presumably by a lighted match drop-  
ped by a smoker, the films were set  
off and an explosion occurred in  
which 38 persons were badly burned,  
two fatally. As a result railroads  
are no longer willing to submit their  
customers to such a hazard.

When films are sent by express,  
they can be inspected when received  
for shipment, and carried in the safe  
manner laid down by the packing  
rules of the Interstate Commerce  
Commission.

This ruling has been recommended  
by the American Railway Association  
and Bureau for Safe Transportation  
of Explosives.

Horse Needed on the Oregon Farm  
Oregon Agricultural College, Cor-  
vallis, Jan. 18.—Governor Withy-  
combe thinks that permanent injury  
is likely to result from the movement  
to supplant the farm horse with trac-  
tors on Oregon farms. He so ex-  
pressed himself on the occasion of his  
recent visit to the College, and gave  
the following reasons for his belief:  
Tractors, used continuously in  
farm operation over a period of years,  
will change the condition of the soil.  
The cheapest power on small farms  
and for short hauls is good draft  
teams.

Farmers need horses and receive  
real benefit from them and from their  
association fellowship.  
"In the development of a horse that  
better meets the need of the farm-  
er," said he, "we must secure an active  
type that has the draft power of the  
present type, combined with action  
and soundness. This type is also popu-  
lar for city draft purposes, and dur-  
ing my visit to San Francisco I  
made an investigation to ascertain  
something of the number of draft  
horses used in that city. In one stable  
I found 400 head. It seems to me that  
the draft horses and American saddle  
horses have the brightest future of  
any of the breeds. Keep your eyes  
on good horses in the future."

Forest Cases Settled.  
The District Forester at Portland,  
Oregon, announces the following legal  
cases as having been settled in Dis-  
trict 6 (Oregon, Washington and  
Alaska) during the past quarter.  
U. S. vs. Walter B. Davidson: On Sep-  
tember 28 defendant pleaded guilty,  
in the U. S. District Court of Oregon,  
to cutting Forest Service telephone  
line on the Oregon National Forest  
and was fined \$10.  
U. S. vs. Joseph Roberts: On Nov-  
ember 3 defendant was arrested at  
Stayton, Oregon, charged with break-  
ing into Seven miles Ranch Station  
on the Santiam National Forest and  
stealing therefrom property belong-  
ing to the United States; also with
