FOUR THINGS DEEMED FIRST

FEDERAL AGENT TELLS OF FARM LIFE.
Water, Power, Bath Room, Lights First Essentials He Says.

Four things are absolutely necessary on the modern farm to insure comforts and provide efficiency. That is the opinion of the government of the United States brought to La Grande yesterday afternoon by George W. Warren, connected with the federal bureau of water supply and sewage disposal.

These four things are: 1st, good supply of water under pressure piped to all buildings on the farm. 2nd, bath room and system of treating sewage. 3rd, heating plant. 4th, combined lighting and power plant.

The speaker gave special attention in addressing Farmers' and Homemakers' delegates, to the manner of disposing of the sewage from the bath room. He advocated as preferable a disposal tank of ample size to handle at least 24 hours of sewage, with drain pipes very close to the surface of the ground on a level grade.

The joints should be so loose that air can get in and sewage out. In this way the disposal tank is kept at even fullness by the drain pipes which take the overflow and by air action make final disposition of the effluent. The length of these drains depends on the soil—if gravel and sandy, less, if solid earth, more. Another method, but not nearly as good is to build a septic tank bricked up without the use of mortar. Over 6,000,000 farmers are being schooled in the manner of building these disposal tanks.

"I should say that \$1000 will build these four requirements, and also a small house to shelter the machinery. This I would call a utility house and might be built on the end of the kitchen. There the farmer can have his heating plant, his power house to operate churns, laundries, separators and all needed equipment. The utility house makes an ideal place for the farm hands to clean up, dry their clothes and keep the mess out of the kitchen. The day is coming when the farmer is going to have these things before he has many other things on his place."

"A well defined plan should be adopted first. Get a clear idea of what you want to do, and if you can't afford to build all at once, build part at a time, working toward a definite end."

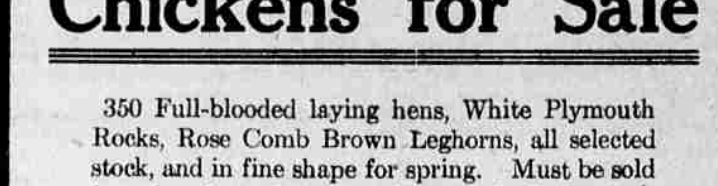
