The Beaver's Tooth. No carpenter's chisel can do more effective work than is turned out with ease and neatness by the beaver's tooth. This is the principal tool with which these patient, clever builders construct their dams. The outer surface of the tooth is a scale of very hard enamel, while the body of it is of softer dentine. As the softer substance wears away in use the end of the tooth takes a chisel-like bevel, leaving a thin, slightly projecting edge of hard enamel as sharp as any carpenter's tool fresh from the oilstone. The thin scale of enamel gives keenness, the softer dentine supplies strength, and thus the combination forms a formidable tool, which actually sharpens itself by use.

Seasoning Cast Iron. In the manufacture of the higher types of machinery care is taken to lessen the cooling stress of iron castings by annealing or some other means in order to make the iron homogeneous and less liable to breakage or distortion. This process is known as "seasoning." It has been found in the case of ordinary test bars one inch square in section that there was a gain in strength of about 20 per cent due to the shocks sustained during an hour in a tumbling barrel as compared with companion bars from the same ladle not so treated.

First Steam Press. On Nov. 20, 1814, a newspaper for the first time was printed by steam. Although the application of steam power to printing machinery had been successfully experimented with some years previously, the hostility of the working printers rendered it undesirable for the masters to introduce such a startling innovation into their printing houses. Toward the end of 1814, however, the growing circulation of the Times made a change of some kind necessary, and in the face of fierce opposition the second John Walter set up a steam printing press. So on the morning of Nov. 29 the leading article of the Times announced to its readers that they held in their hands that day a copy of the first newspaper to be printed by steam.—London Answers.

Fletcher as Ambassador to Mexico. Washington—From second secretary of an unimportant legation to an ambassadorship in thirteen years is the record made by Henry Frather Fletcher, Ambassador to Chile, who was confirmed by the Senate today ambassador to Mexico. This is said

by State Department officials to be a case of promotion by merit, strictly.

Fletcher was born in Pennsylvania April 10, 1873 and calls Chambersburg his home. He is a lawyer by profession, served with the army in Cuba in 1898 and was first lieutenant and later battalion adjutant of the 40th Infantry in the Philippines for two years.

Fletcher received his first appointment to the diplomatic service April 2, 1902, as second secretary to the Havana legation. Following that he was appointed second secretary to the Pekin legation, April 28, 1903; secretary to the Lisbon legation, Mar. 10, 1905; secretary to the Pekin legation, April 26, 1907; and Minister to Chile, Dec. 21, 1909. On May 5, 1915 the legation was raised to an embassy.

Fletcher is a master of Spanish and an authority on Latin-American affairs, knows the south American people, their habits and characteristics and is considered eminently fitted for his new post. His friends describe him as an "all-around" man, being fond of sports, particularly polo, motoring, bridge and dancing.

Mobile Abl. Feb. (Hold For Release)—Representatives of the miners and operators of the central competitive field, composing western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, met here today to begin wage scale negotiations that will determine whether strikes or prosperity will usher in the month of April. Most wage scale agreements expire April 1.

The miners representatives came to enforce the demands formulated during the recent convention of the United Mine Workers of America in Indianapolis. The demand is for a flat increase of 10 per cent in wages and a request that the mine run system be established in every state now having it, as a basis for wages.

His Elaborate Efforts. "One should beware of beginning his speech in too loud a voice," said Grout.

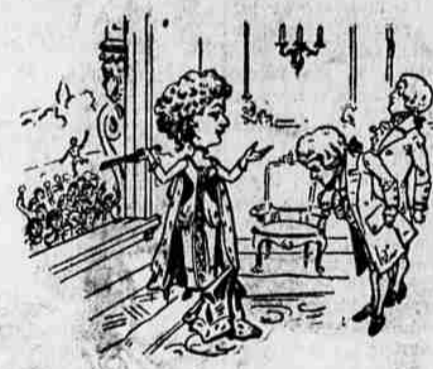
