CHINOOK HITS LADD CANYON

DIFFICULTIES OF TRAVEL ARE OVERCOME.

School Closed One Day but Attendance Is Diminished.

Ladd Canyon, Feb. 7.—(Special)—With a chinook wind blowing the past two days the snow which was at least two feet on the level is disappearing very fast. It is reported that the snow is five feet deep up in the Canyon.

School was only discontinued one day last week but those who do go find it difficult to travel.

Dick Peebler, who delivers the Blue Mountain company's patron's cream was very fortunate in only having to make one delivery after the snow got so deep. He made the trip without much trouble on Saturday with two horses, by the use of a sled. Mr. McCauley who delivers to the Valley Creamery makes a trip every other day, only losing one day. He was the first one over the road after traveling became difficult and was from nine o'clock Thursday morning until half past eight that evening with six horses making the trip. The snow became deeper as they neared La Grande. Our mail carrier only got through once. The Hot Lake road over which many from here haul straw from Mr. Rinehart's, which became impassable, was dragged Saturday and Sunday.

RATE ON HORSES IS MINE

Shipping Companies Relate Immense Profits That Are Gained.

New York, Jan. 27.—Just how much transatlantic steamship lines are making from the shipment of horses to the

allies came out in a suit brought in the Federal District Court by the Baker-Miller Shipping company and Michael P. McGrath to recover alleged commissions due them.

The complaint explains that in April the defendant, Thomas Harling & Son, Montreal steamship agents, with offices at 80 Broad street and 32 Broadway, shipped 20,918 horses on Prince line boats.

At \$50 a head the Prince line, the complaint states, collected \$1,545,900 for freightage and the plaintiffs claim commissions of \$26,147.50. In August 18,000 more horses were shipped, upon which the Prince line collected as gross freight approximately \$1,000,000.

The plaintiffs are suing for commissions on the shipments.

Petrograd is Crowded

Petrograd, Jan. 4.—It is estimated that the population of Petrograd, including every class of transient and refugee, has grown from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 since the war began. The suburbs of both Petrograd and Moscow, usually occupied only in Summer, are overcrowded this Winter. Besides the usual refugees from the war zone, thousands of country folk have flocked to Moscow, fearing to remain in the little country towns this Winter.

The influx has been so great that students in the universities there are unable to find the cheap cheerful rooms to which they have hitherto repaired, and many have been sleeping in the railway stations. As these are closed a few hours of the early morning, part of the night has to be spent outdoors.

MILLIONAIRE IS PUT IN JAIL

Corning, N. Y., Jan. 27.—George C. Bayless, millionaire president of the Bayless Pulp & Paper Company of Austin, Pa. and Bingham, N. Y., was arrested at Courdesport, Pa. the charge of involuntary manslaughter in causing the death of Mrs. Lawler in the flood of Austin, in September, 1911.

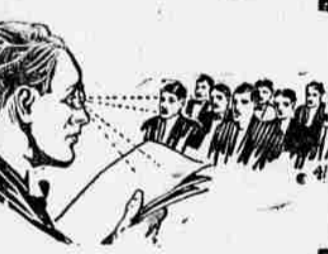
