BOUTS PUT OFF 1 WEEK

LIKE OTHER THINGS, DATES ARE DELAYED.

Fashionable Now Days to Postpone Things—Plans Are Upset.

It is quite fashionable these days to postpone things—in fact few functions in La Grande the past two weeks have come off on schedule. Among these is the boxing and wrestling program at the Y. M. C. A. set down for next Wednesday night. The committee in charge has found it is necessary to delay the event a week or so, and final dates will be announced later, but it will probably be one week from that date—in fact unless otherwise stipulated, that is the date set.

It's bad business to shoot dear out of season, especially when one gets caught at it. For example:

"Fined \$25 and given a 30 day jail sentence for killing a deer, Billy Stanley, a young man living on the North Fork of the John Day, was permitted to return home to care for his stock during the present severe weather. The man was arrested by Deputy Warden George Tonkin who made a trip over the snow after the offender. He was convicted before Justice of the Peace McReynolds of Pilot Rock. His stock was reported in bad condition and, relying upon the promise of the young man to return after the snow leaves to serve out his sentence, that official suspended the sentence for the time being. The carcass of deer was brought to Pendleton and given to St. Anthony's hospital.

Observations by Deputy Game Warden John Walden to the effect that the loss of game birds, though while considerable, is not as great as might be supposed, are borne out by similar investigations west of the mountains.

"Reports of the loss of game birds have been exaggerated says Marion Jack, member of the fish and game commission, who reached home yesterday after having been snow bound for 93 hours at Bonneville. The game survived the storm better than was expected but there have been some losses, particularly quail, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

"While held at Bonneville by the blockade Mr. Jack had opportunity to observe conditions at the state fish hatchery there. He says the fry in the main hatchery is all safe but that there is danger some of the fish in the ponds will be lost. In a freshet these fish are likely to be swept into the Columbia river.

"The snow was six feet deep at Bonneville and the local man says he felt he remained there long enough to be allowed to vote.

"Deputy Game Warden Tonkin has received some reports from Athena indicating the feeding of game birds has materially helped keep them from perishing.

"T. J. De Freece of Athena has been feeding quail and says they have survived the storm though some Hungarian partridges were lost.

"Charles Gerking also helped in feeding quail and says many birds were thus saved from starving.

"Jack Vincent of Athena believes that few game birds were lost in that section during the storm.

"The chief danger has been from hawks that take advantage of the enfeebled condition of game birds and

prey upon them.

"Grain companies or other parties having grain sweepings or grain samples they will donate for feeding game birds are asked to notify G. J. Ladow, so that the sportsmen may make arrangements to use the same."

FILM CENSORS RIDICULED

Washington, Feb. 1.—Martin W. Littleton of New York, appearing before the House committee on education in opposition to the proposed National moving picture censorship law, ridiculed the idea that a commission in Washington should sit in judgment on the morals of a great nation.

"What is an immoral picture or film?" asked Mr. Littleton. "Who can answer that question? Must that question be answered for 100,000,000 people by five men, whom they do not choose? Must that question, which reaches from the nether sewers of flagrant immorality into the very stars of ethical firmament, be answered for every man, woman and child in the Nation by a group of quixotic and querulous old gentlemen solemnly setting the morals of a nation by Presidential appointment?"

"Shall the educated, amusement-loving men and women of America call on Congress to answer this question, and then shall Congress in turn leave it to a body of five men to answer it? What is an immoral film or picture which shall be withheld from the view of the public? If Congress is speaking for the people, will it write into the law an answer to this question, or will it remit us to an appointive board for the answer?"

ROSE SHOW POSTERS OUT

EASTERN ARTIST DRAWS PICTURE.

Portland Rose Show to Have Handsome Poster Design This Year.

Portland's Tenth Annual Rose Festival (June 7, 8 and 9, will be advertised this year by a poster design, the gift of Fred G. Cooper, famous eastern artist, whose work is seen frequently in weekly and monthly magazines of national prominence. Mr. Cooper is a native son of Oregon and his father, J. C. Cooper, is one of the best known pioneers in the state. The poster features the 1916 slogan, "For You A Rose In Portland Grows" and includes a view of the new Columbia river highway, which will be dedicated June 7, opening day of the fiesta.

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
