'DARK HORSE' IS EXPECTED

California Says Party Will Not Nominate Much Adversed Man

Washington, Feb. 1.—"In my opinion, the Republican convention at Chicago will not name any man who has used the Republican party to advertise himself," remarked former Representative J. C. Needham, of San Diego, Cal., at the Willard. "In California sentiment has not crystallized to any great extent except to show that the Progressive party as a National organization is no longer important. Locally, California has perhaps more Progressive party organizations than any other state in the Union, due, of course, to Governor Johnson. The name of Justice Hughes is heard of more than that of any other Republican, and next to him, perhaps, Governor McCall, of Massachusetts, is spoken of. Believe the Chicago convention will name a man to head the ticket who is not now a candidate. As chairman Hilles put it, the nominee of the Republican party will be born in the convention hall.

Governor Johnson's position in the coming campaign is uncertain," added Mr. Needham. "He has not indicated what he ma do, but it is to be presumed he will go as a delegate to the Progressive National Convention."
