SAYS FIGURES WERE GARBLED

W. AL JONES STATES HIS SIDE OF CASE.

Claims that Richardson Twisted Figures to State Fair Loss.

Salem, Feb. 14.—"Figures can't lie but figures can," says W. Al Jones relative to the report of the expert accountants on the state fair books, which purported to show that the ex-secretary operated the state fair at an actual loss of \$1592, rather than a gain of about \$3000 as first reported at the last meeting of the board before A. H. Lea was elected to succeed W. Al Jones as secretary.

Mr. Jones has not seen the report of the expert but says they have charged him unjustly of entering into unauthorized contracts since he was authorized to proceed with President Booth to employ a band and other attractions and that it would have been folly and useless to be obliged to call the board together every time some manufacturer wanted to rent a hundred square feet of floor space.

Mr. Jones states that according to the accounts as checked up December 1, 1914, Frank Meredith, the former secretary, had \$5,982.14 on the books at that time and when Mr. Jones turned the books over to A. H. Lea there was a credit of \$8208.08. Mr. Jones says he placed over \$11,000 in permanent improvements on the fair grounds and buildings and that it would be as unjust to charge this to operating expenses as it would have been to charge that Frank Meredith lost \$60,000 in 1914 because the new pavilion was erected.

Mr. Jones promises to air the actual financial condition of the fair as soon as he has had a chance to look over the report of the experts. This report is now in the Governor's possession and as Governor Withycombe is out of town today it was impossible to secure the report.

"UNKNOWN" AT ARCADE

An error was made in the heading of the announcement for the Arcade in yesterday's Observer. The production to be presented is "The Unknown" and not "The Explorer" as was announced.

Lou-Tellegen, the distinguished romantic actor, who scored such a pronounced success in "The Explorer," will be seen at the Arcade today and this evening in his second Jesse L. Lasky production, "The Unknown," a gripping drama of the famous Foreign Legion in Algeria. In this photodrama Mr. Tellegen is seen in a character entirely different from anything he has played heretofore, either on the speaking stage or the screen.

The Foreign Legion is a military sanctuary where men who have met with misfortune or disgrace may redeem their past by bravery and honorable service. No questions are asked and no papers are required to explain who or what they are. This organization is stationed in Algeria and the pages of history abound with mention of its heroic exploits. Volumes have been written about its romance and tradition. Princes in its ranks have rubbed shoulders with murderers; thieves have fought side by side with the aristocracy. A man is taken for what he is, not for what he was. Into this, comes Lou-Tellegen as an English ne'er do well. The Captain of his company is known as "Devil Destin."

A young American girl, whom the Private saved during a brawl in an Algerian dance hall, has taken a great deal of interest in him and when Destin discovers that his attentions to the girl are unwelcome, he starts

persecuting the Private. Persecution follows persecution, until finally, the Private is to be shot for mutiny. His friends effect his escape and with the girl, disguised as an Arab boy, he flees into the Desert. They are found by Destin. The Captain sees a Victoria Cross on the young man's breast and suddenly realizes that he has been persecuting his own son, from whom he disappeared years before when the father had been cashiered from the British Army. How the young man is freed and returns to England to be the head of an honorable family completes this story of thrilling instances.

The production is of the usual lavish Lasky character, true to detail and artistic in its presentation and, with its wonderful photography, makes a photodrama long to be remembered. In the cast supporting Mr. Tellegen are Theodore Roberts, Dorothy Davenport, Hal Clements, Horace B. Carpenter, Tom Forman, Raymond Hatton and other members of the Lasky all-star organization.—Adv.

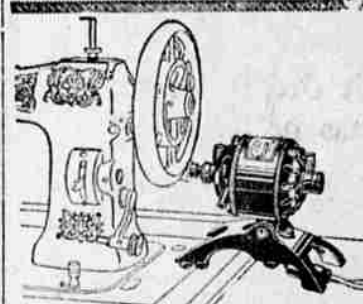
